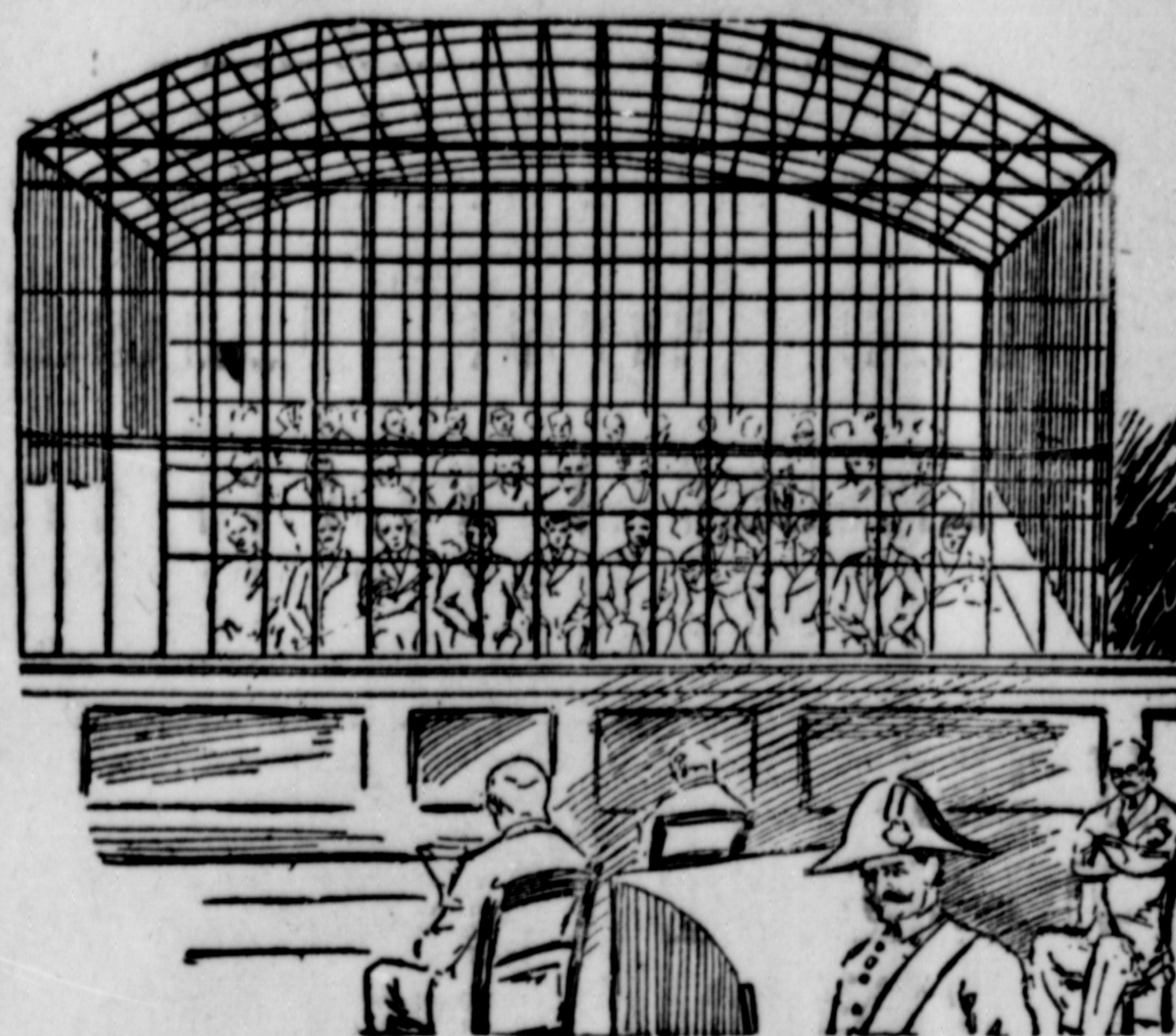

WORLD FAMOUS TRIAL HAS
COME TO AN END IN ITALYNINE CAMORRISTS FOUND GUILTY OF MURDER—BRIEF AC-
COUNT OF THE TRIAL—THE CELEBRATED IRON CAGE
WILL NOW BE A CURIOSITY.At last the famous trial of the
Camorra of Italy, the members
of the powerful secret society
being charged with crimes rang-
ing from ordinary blackmail to
murder, has come to an end.Of the 41 persons originally
indicted three were never cap-
tured, three died during the trial,
while twenty were liberated dur-
ing the trial's progress, owing to
the fact that they had already
served the maximum time pos-
sible for sentence in the event of
a conviction.

Nine Murderers.

Nine of the accused were
unanimously declared guilty ofand mothers, arrived in the
morning, bringing an offering of
wax candles of the Madonna,
while others brought gifts for St.
Rosa, the patron of Viterbo.
Many of them took up their posi-
tions early in the churches fac-
ing the court house, where they
remained kneeling, beating their
breasts and imploring mercy for
their beloved ones.

Priest's Shame.

When the presiding judge re-
sumed his summing up, all the
accused maintained an absolutely
calm demeanor. Only Giro Vi-
tozzi, the priest, known as the
"guardian angel of the Camorra,"

the murder of Genarro Cuocolo
and his wife. The remainder
a criminal association.It had been expected that the
trial, which has been going on
two years, would be concluded
soon, and great excitement pre-
vailed. Reinforcements of troops
and mounted police arrived be-
fore the opening of court to as-
sist in maintaining order. A
body of 300 police has been es-
pecially entrusted with the sur-
veillance of the court and its
precincts.Several relations of the ac-
cused, comprising wives, sistersdisplayed any shame at being
forced to enter the iron cage with
the other prisoners. He muttered
prayers all the time, saying:"I am in the hands of God and
of the jurors, whom I pray the
Almighty to illuminate."The verdict declares Corrado
Sartino guilty of both murders;
Nicolo Morro, Antonio Cerrato
and Marsano de Gennaro guilty
of the murder of Cuocolo, and
Giuseppe Salvi, as well as Corrado
Sartino, guilty of the murder of
Cuocolo's wife.The instigators of the mur-
ders, including Enrico Alfano,
Giovanni Rapi, De Marinas and
others, also are declared guilty.TAKE GOOD CARE OF YOUR EYES

TO LAST YOU ALL YOUR LIFEThe eye, it has been said, is
the window of the soul, and it
behooves us, therefore, to keep
that window very bright and

a strain to the eyes to use them
when you are in a recumbent po-
sition. To stitch at inordinately
fine needlework is also a mistake.An hour's rest daily in a dark
room is what I recommend to the
eye tired, and then that they
should first slap gently the fur-
rowed places with the finger tips
to bring blood to the surface, and
then massage all round them very
soothingly.A German oculist whose name
is a household word recommends
a firm rubbing movement with
the fingers from side to side of
the forehead just above the eye-
brows for relieving that sensa-
tion of pressure from which those
with astigmatic eyes so frequent-
ly suffer. A massage of the eye-
lids is another treatment of
value.If these precautions and care-
ful little spells of massage were
undertaken, with methodical rest,
day after day, by women ofmiddle age they would doubtless
be able to ward off the approach-
ing time of wearing eye glasses
or spectacles. I can only entreat,
however, of any woman to con-
sult an oculist in good time if
she suffers from any sensation
of eye fatigue. The sight usually
changes at 45, and reading
glasses adopted at the right
juncture will preserve the eyes
for long years.Apply white vaseline, or olive
oil if preferred, to the eyebrows
at night with a finely pointed
camel's hair brush, and add
night after night a thin curved
line where the eyebrows should
extend, if they are too thin as
they are. If eyebrows are too
bushy pinch them together and
smooth them down with the un-
guent to make them look less
prominent.

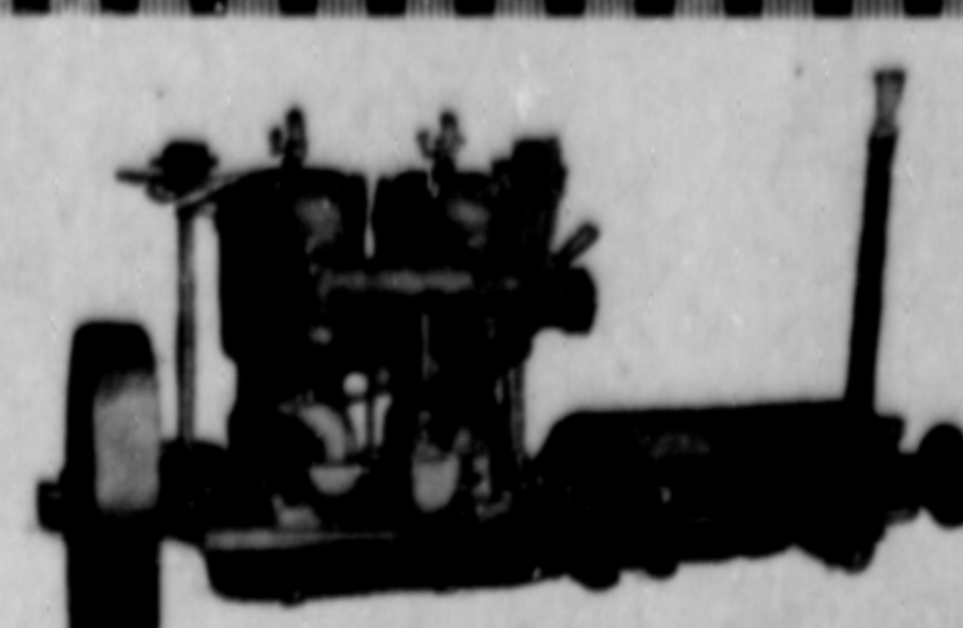
