WELCOME TO PREMIER AND OPENING OF WHARF

PRINCESS MAY ARRIVES 2 P. M.; PREMIER SIR RICHARD M'BRIDE IS WELCOMED BY THRONGS

Official announcement was made this morning by the C. P. agent here that the Princess May would arrive punctually at 2 p. m. Arrangements have been made in very creditable style for the welcoming of the Premier. Through the efforts of the decoration committee, aided by willing helpers, amongst whom must be mentioned Shaf Thomson of the Longshoremen's union, the Government wharf has been decked out with arches bearing appropriate mottoes and venues of evergreens. Banners float everywhere around there and the scene is a gay one.

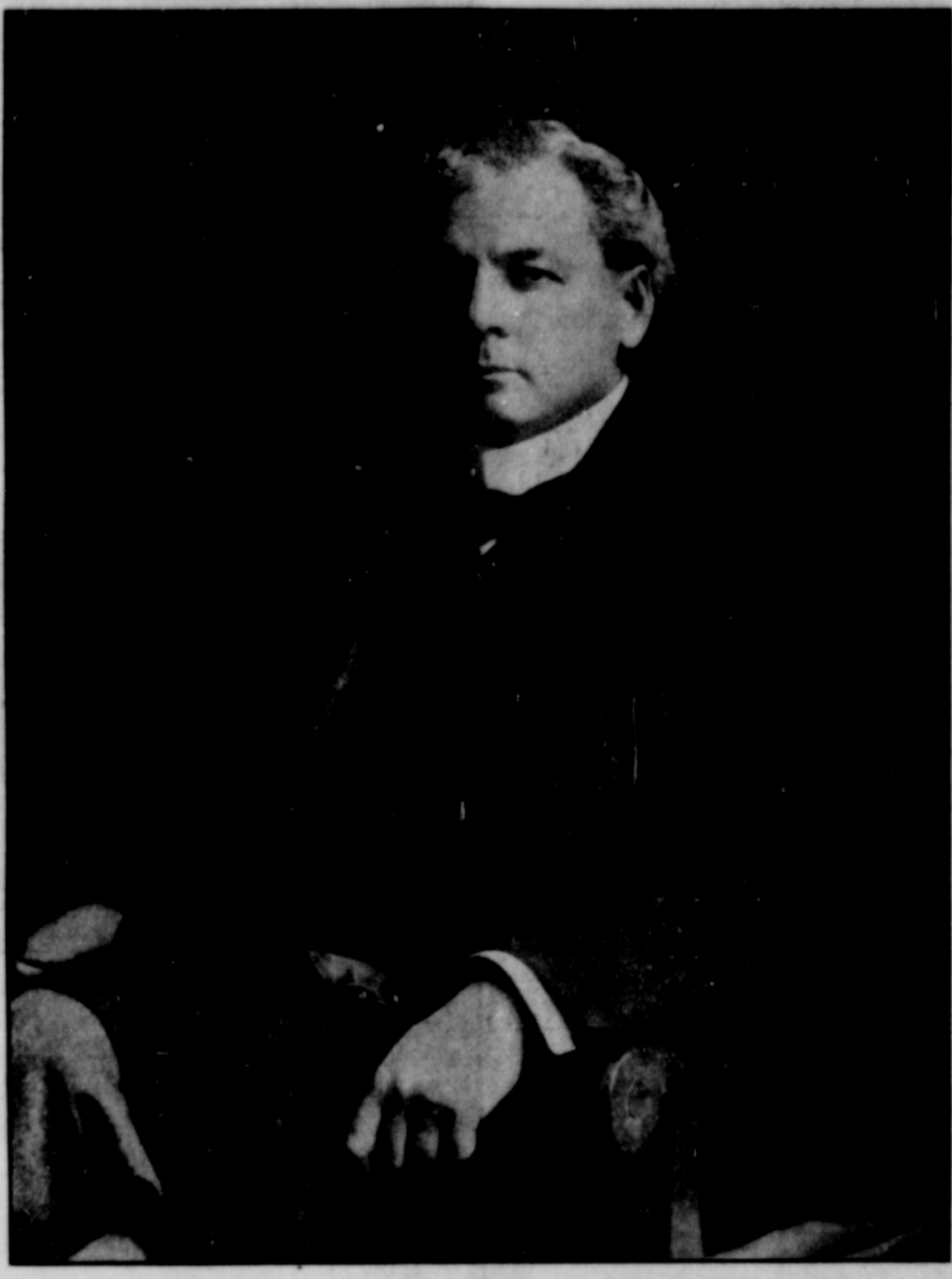
Procession at Sea.
On the Dominion government launch Evelyn the reception committee set out at 1:30 to meet the day and escort the Premier to the wharf. The city band, on board the Eleanor Mac, also meets the May, and as many

launches as can will join the procession. On the first arch at the wharf, which will be opened by the Premier today, there is the legend, "A hearty welcome to you, Sir Richard," and a farther arch bears a quotation from Proverbs saying, "The king delighteth to honor his faithful servant."

Meeting in Theatre.
After the opening of the wharf Premier McBride will be kept busy viewing the city and receiving certain deputations with affairs for his attention.

For the meeting to be held in the evening in the Westholm Theatre there will be few addresses outside of those given by the Premier and Mr. Bowser. The meeting will be presided over by G. D. Tite, the chairman of the citizens' committee. William Manson, the member for the district, and Dr. Kergin, the vice chairman of the citizens' committee, will speak briefly.

ORIGINATOR OF OVERSEAS CLUB VISITS PRINCE RUPERT AND ADDRESSES MANY

A well attended public meeting was held under the auspices of the Overseas Club in McIntyre Hall on Saturday evening to listen to addresses by its organizers, Mr. Evelyn Wrench and his sister, Miss Wrench, who are on a visit to the coast. The chair was taken by Mayor Newton, and Mr. Frank A. Ellis, the president of the local club, occupied a seat upon the platform. Mr. Wrench and his sister, who are both clever and entertaining speakers, were accorded a hearty reception and were listened to with the greatest of attention during their interesting and instructive addresses. Mr. Wrench outlined the short history of the club, from its inception some six years ago to the present time, with its three hundred and fifty organized clubs and ninety thousand members, a third of which membership is in the Dominion of Canada. Mr. Wrench, who is a poli-

ished and fluent platform speaker, in a few terse sentences pointed out the objects and aims of the club, also dispelling from the minds of his hearers any ideas that the movement smacked in the least of jingoism or self advertisement, or was anti-American in any manner of way. There were other aims in life than the pursuit of the dollar, also naval and military matters were not the sole object in the formation of the club. Rather the binding together of the different portions of the empire, the purifying of public life and the raising of the standards by which the social life of its communities are ruled. These were objects worthy of their most strenuous efforts. It is expected ultimately that a club headquarters will be opened in London, where visiting members will always feel welcome when foregathering from the many parts of the dominions beyond the seas.

MAGNIFICENT MARATHON RUN AT THE GREAT GAMES IN SWEDEN; CANADIANS WIN LAURELS

Stockholm, July 15.—South Africa and Canada divided the honors at the Olympic meet today, the former capturing the marathon race, the most important number on the Olympic programme, and George Hodgson of Canada setting a new world's record and winning the chief swimming event, the final in the 100 metre race. The winner of the classical marathon was K. K. McArthur, a tall Transvaal policeman. His compatriot, W. G. Githaw, came second into the stadium, several hundred yards behind, and third to appear was the American, Graston Strobino, of the South Paterson Athletic Club, who put up a braver fight than most of the runners, for his feet were skinned and bleeding and he was suffering great pain. He never lost his nerve though, and made a brave attempt at feeling happy while he traversed the stadium track a furlong behind

the second man at the end of the performance.

The times as announced were: McArthur, 2 hours 36 minutes; Githaw, 2 hours 37 minutes 52 seconds; Strobino, 2 hours 38 minutes 42-4 seconds. The Americans gave a death blow to the theory that the athletes of the United States are better at contests which require quickness and agility than in tests of endurance.

TWO HOTELS FINED HEAVILY FOR OFFENSE

Port Alberni, July 15.—Two hundred dollars was the fine imposed on each of the proprietors of the Arlington and Somass Hotels of Alberni and Port Alberni, respectively, for having supplied liquor to an auto driver while he was under the influence of drink. This is the sequel to the fatal accident that took place last week when W. N. Clarke was killed in an auto accident while riding in a car driven by George Clarke. Both cases have been appealed on the ground that there was not sufficient evidence to warrant a conviction. M. A. Ward is the proprietor of the Arlington and A. E. Waterhouse owns the Somass. Mr. Waterhouse is mayor of Port Alberni, as well as being chairman of the license commission.

HON. FRANK COCHRANE, MINISTER OF RAILWAYS G. T. P. THROUGH IN 1914

Hon. Frank Cochrane, minister of railways for the Dominion, left for the south by the Prince Rupert this morning, accompanied by his son and secretary, also Mr. H. S. Clements. The Railway Minister had a strenuous time during his visit, and covered a great deal of ground with his accustomed energy. After thoroughly inspecting the city, which surprised him by its development and enterprise, he made a fast trip in the government launch Evelyn to the canneries along the slough. He visited Cassiar and Inverness canneries, saw the process with the fish and was presented with finished packed cans of the product which he had watched from the raw to the can.

Inspected G. T. P.
The Minister also visited the cold storage plant, which much impressed him, and yesterday he made a thorough inspection of the completed portion of the G.

T. P. General Superintendent Mehan took him over the line in his special car, and the result was Mr. Cochrane's very evident approval of everything he saw. Interviewed, the Railway Minister expressed practically the certainty that the G. T. P. will be completed before 1914, and showed very great confidence in President Chamberlin's powers to rush things forward.

Groundhog Route.
He had nothing to give out in regard to the railway to the Groundhog Mountain, this subject of great importance to Prince Rupert being still under close consideration. Captain Nicholson, of the G. T. P. steamship department, attended the Minister's party north, and the Hon. Mr. Cochrane was very much impressed by the superb tourist facilities and attractions of the coast route.

SWEEPING MAJORITY FOR LIBERALS IN SASKATCHEWAN; DETAILS FROM REGINA

Regina, July 15.—With Rosewyn and Lloydminster now definitely placed in the Liberal columns, it appears almost certain that the best the Conservatives can hope for in the new legislature is seven members, showing a Liberal majority of forty in the house. At the present time six seats are all they can claim, viz: Ramsden, Moose Jaw, Prince Albert (city), North and South du'Appelle and Maple Creek. Shellbrook is still in doubt,

but the result in this constituency should be known tomorrow. Pinto Creek, with eight polls heard from, gives S. R. Moore (Liberal) 77 majority. Thirty polls are still to come, and the Liberals claim that the majority will run into the hundreds.

A delightful launch outing is planned by the Presbyterian Ramble Club for Tuesday evening next, weather permitting. The launch will leave the Government wharf at 7:45.

NEW PASTOR ST. ANDREW'S ANGLICAN
