## TORONTO GLOBE IS ASTOUNDED AT CONSERVATIVE ELECTION THREAT

Conservatives in Struggle for Election in Saskatchewan Used Advertisements Warning Foreign Voters That Homesteads Could Only be Obtained by Voting Conservative---Method Said to Startle Even Eastern Conservatives---What Would They Think of Some of the Methods Western B.C. Has Seen at Elections?

"THE CONSERVATIVE PARTY IS THE ONLY ONE THAT CONTROLS THE PUBLIC LANDS. ALL HOMESTEADS MUST BE OBTAINED FROM THE CONSERVATIVES."

Worthy of the party that issued a bogus royal proclamation calling upon the Indians of Halldand to vote for a Conservative candidate are the appeals now being made to the immigrants from Continental Europe to vote for Mr. Robert Rogers' nominees in the Saskatchewan election tomorrow. That reproduced above is the most striking feature of full page advertisements that appeared last week in the four Catholic papers published in Winnipeg. The papers that carried the advertisements were the Northwest Review (published in English), the Canada West (German), the Gazeta Katolicka (Polish), and the Ruthenian Weekly.

No Doubt of It.

Mr. Rogers, or the agent who prepared this gigantic threat on his behalf, does not leave the foreign settlers in doubt as to the meaning to be attached to the notice, which goes on to say: "There are thousands of acres of land now held under lease

which are closed to settlers, but these will soon be thrown open by the Conservative party for homesteading. Many more thousands of acres are now locked up from the settlers will be opened to them by the Conservatives. This is the party of the settlers' support. The Scott government can do nothing for the settler, for it has nothing to do with the granting of homesteads. There is only one party that can help settlers—the Conservative party."

East Fairly Shocked.

The political history of Canada contains no such flagrant public attempt as this to bribe the electorate of an entire province, and to drag down such as cannot be bribed. What do the decent Conservatives of the east think of this public announcement to the Poles, and Ruthenians, and Galicians of the west that "all homesteads must be obtained from the Conservatives," and the inference intended to be drawn, and that will be drawn, from it, that the man who wants a homestead or desires to keep the homestead he has had better vote for the Conservative candidate?

Oh, You Political Wolf!  
That is politics as played by

the Hon. Robert Rogers. What does the Hon. W. T. White think of it? Does he believe that it will advance the cause of Canadian nationality to turn a political wolf like the Minister of the Interior loose on the ignorant foreign settlers of the west? It was sometimes alleged by the Conservatives that the homestead inspectors of the Department of the Interior under Liberal rule put pressure upon the settlers to vote Liberal, but few specific instances were given, and nothing of a flagrant nature disclosed.

Simply Political Slavery.

Here, under a government that is held up as a model of all the virtues, we have public warning given to the settlers of the west that the Conservative party "expects the support of the settlers," accompanied by the grim reminder that "all homesteads must be obtained from the Conservatives." The Rogers method of campaigning, if successful, would reduce the settlers of the west to a condition of bondage little short of slavery itself. Saskatchewan must either smash the Rogers machine or pass under the yoke of Canada's most unscrupulous politician.—Toronto Globe.

## MIGHT OCCUR ANY OLD DAY IN PRINCE RUPERT

A stone that was blown 1,000 feet at Vancouver and caused the death of Sunder Singh weighed less than a pound and would not cover the palm of a man's hand. Sunder Singh was employed on the C. P. R. clearing on Granville street south. It is the custom to let off the blasts on this work at noon. The foreman sent out the usual guards with red flags to prevent the approach of persons till after the blast had gone off. One of these men, Gunda Singh, was accompanied on his walk out to the safety line by Sunder Singh, and while Gunda waved his red flag and called out "blast" and "fire" Sunder sat down to eat his lunch. Gunda did not see any stone coming, he swore, but he saw Gunda collapse and then he set up a shout. Sunder was removed to the hospital, where he died soon after admission from a fractured skull. The jury brought in a verdict of accidental death.
