A SPY SCARE IN GERMANY TROUBLES BRITISH TOURISTS

Kiel, Aug. 13.—Germany is in the grip of another spy scare today. Following yesterday's arrest at Eckenforde, of five Englishmen just landed from Copenhagen and suspected of spying on the Kaiser's coast fortifications, a German sergeant, corporal and private were arrested today accused of furnishing information to England and to France.

From the Englishmen, who had crossed from the Danish capital in a cutter, it is said many photographs and notes were taken. The men have been sent to jail in Metz, where they will be tried. In little more than two years Germany has punished 18 foreigners or Germans said to be in foreign employ, who were charged with spying.

ANCIENT REFUGE OF CAVALIER

The farm was built in the early part of the sixteenth century and was once a manor house. In the chamber was antique oak furniture, including a table on which lay old firearms, household utensils and the remains, reduced to dust, of a repast. It is surmised that the room was used as a hiding place by Royalist fugitives during the civil war in the reign of Charles I, and that since then it had remained undisturbed.

London, Aug. 13.—A movement is afoot in England toward the formation of a corps of sea scouts. The idea is to provide training in the departments of manipulating boats and reading signals.

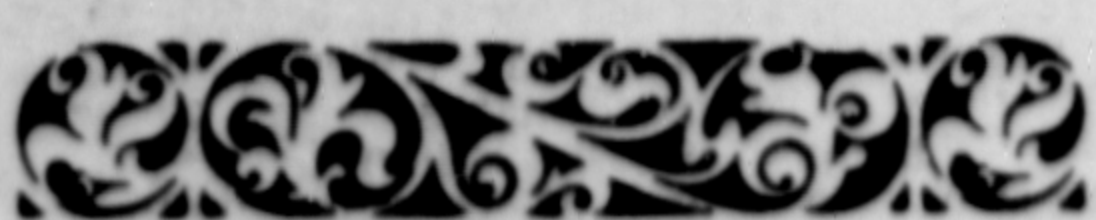
