TRAIN ROBBER RUNNING FOR RESPONSIBLE POSITION OF COUNTY ATTORNEY IN U.S.

Oklahoma City, Aug. 17.—“A train robber is better than a public yegg,” has been the campaign slogan of A. L. Jennings, noted train robber and member of the famous “Dalton gang,” who was nominated in today’s primaries for county attorney over a half dozen opponents. Jennings declared on the stump that the Dalton gang was a tame affair as compared to the present “court house gang,” who were embezzlers to the amount of \$50,000.

Robbed Trains Formerly.
 “I have stolen more than that amount from trains in this territory,” he declared, “and I have ridden away with it tied on behind my saddle in a seamless sack, but I was caught at last, and now my greatest desire is to prove that I can be an honest official.”

“A train robber who is trying to lead an honest life is far better than a public official who, under the guise of respectability and honesty, robs the people.”

“Jennings draws large crowds nightly to hear him narrate his bandit experiences. He was serving a ten year sentence in the penitentiary for robbing the mails when he was pardoned by Roosevelt.”

“We cannot at present fight,” added Lord Beresford, “and we shall not be ready for some time to come.”

Vigorously opposing a naval alliance with a foreign country he urged that the Empire should defend its own territory with its own ships. “The alliance we should desire is one with the overseas dominions.”

“England,” he concluded, “does not fear invasion but starvation. We have reduced our fleet, we have reduced our army while the other nations are forging ahead with leaps and bounds. I say stop fooling the people; tell them the truth.”

POOR CROP OUTLOOK IN GT. BRITAIN

London, Aug. 17.—Over an extensive area of the British Isles the harvest prospect is assuming a very serious aspect, in consequence of the vagaries of the weather, which has now been of a more or less unfavorable type since the advent of June. A year ago the country had a summer of intense heat and dryness, which enabled farmers to complete their harvesting operations some weeks earlier than usual. This season they have to sit with folded arms waiting for a cessation of all but daily rain storms.

Official statistics show that in the nine weeks from the beginning of June the frequency of rain has been unusually great over nearly the whole of the United Kingdom, while the total quantity of the water which has fallen is largely in excess of normal. Within the last few days the rain storms have increased in intensity and falls of one inch a day are rather common. Some times the amount has exceeded two inches. Unfortunately there is no prospect of an improvement in conditions.

SHARP SENTENCES FOR VICIOUS SUFFRAGETTES
 Dublin, Aug. 17.—Mrs. Leigh and Miss Gladys Evans, suffragettes, were sentenced to five years’ penal servitude each for attempting to burn the Royal Theatre on July 18th to prevent Premier Asquith from speaking there the evening afterward. Miss Mary Baker was sentenced to seven months’ imprisonment as an accomplice.
