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DUBLIN MAN CONTRACTED FOOT AND MOUTH DISEASE

WAS BITTEN BY AN ANIMAL INFECTED WITH IT A MONTH AGO—SUCH CASES ARE OF RARE OCCURRENCE.

New York, Aug. 30.—A cable to the Tribune from London says: George A. Bell, a veterinarian in the Irish department of agriculture, has developed foot and mouth disease in consequence of being bitten on the finger by an infected animal a month ago.

The disease is rare among men

The only other case known in Ireland occurred in Dublin 30 years ago.

A fresh outbreak of the disease has been discovered at Swords, eight miles north of Dublin and Dunlark is closed as a port for the shipment of cattle to England. The disease is also strong in France.

WOMEN MUST SAVE BRITAIN

New York, Aug. 30.—"The women are going to save England. The men are losing vitality. There is no disputing the fact that the suffrage movement over there is destined to bear fruit. The women are determined and if the nation survives, it will be due to them."

This was the startling statement made by Robbins Gilman, head worker in the university settlement of the East Side, who returned from Europe today on the liner Minnetonka. He attended the first international eugenics congress held in the University of London, July 24 to 31. "In the streets of London," continued the settlement worker, "if the visitor observes closely the passer-by, he cannot fail to be impressed by the healthy faces and generally rugged appearance of the women in contrast to the men. They walk with the air of self confidence and seem to realize a new era in the lives of English women has begun. The children of these women may do much for the empire."

Gilman said the paper read to the congress by Professor Chas. Smith of the University of Minnesota caused a commotion but, although he angered his audience at times, he made up for that before he was finished. His references to Australia, in which he said that country was populated by criminals of Great Britain, annoyed the Britishers. Gilman said:

"It was Professor Smith who told the congress 'I would rather have as my father a robust burglar than a consumptive bishop, but as soon as I was born I would like to be removed from my environments.'"

HORRIBLE GRUESOME RELIC

London, Ont., Aug. 30.—Among the gruesome finds which have been made since the jail has undergone its overhauling is the rope that was used in the last public hanging in Middlesex county. It was used on December 15, 1868 when Thomas Jones suffered the death penalty for the murder of his young niece. Besides the rope, the black cap, and straps were found where they have mouldered in the dust for so many years.
