## MEMORIAL SERVICES TO LATE GENERAL BOOTH

(Continued from Page 1.)

when in port could hardly be estimated. Mr. Rushbrook was proud and happy to relate how upon more occasions than he could count it had been his pleasure and privilege to receive the hospitality and welcome of a Salvation Army meeting house in many of the great seaports.

Rev. F. W. Kerr.

Captain Tuttle here made some announcements in connection with the services this coming week, after which the Rev. F. W. Kerr of the Presbyterian Church gave an address on the passing of the great master mind and leader of the Salvation Army, Mr. Kerr, after referring in the most eulogistic terms to the late general, compared him to the great prophets of old, from Elisha and Elijah of ancient times to those of later dates—Wycliffe, Luther and John Knox. General Booth was the prophet of the working man, he was the greatest empire builder of modern times. Through the marvellous organization of the Salvation Army an empire had arisen greater by far than any that the world would ever see under the sway of a lay ruler.

Such an empire was the greatest sepulchre man has ever raised to himself. After a few statistics as to the actual results of the great work done by the Army in every quarter of the globe, the Presbyterian pastor concluded, remarking that the general had brought a new message to the world, causing us at the present moment to be met together mourning an almost irreparable loss.

Rev. W. H. McLeod.

The Rev. W. H. McLeod followed, and in his most eloquent way in a few words as a minister representing the Baptist Church, joined with his brother clergy and friends in offering his meed of praise and appreciation of the great departed head of the Salvation Army. After remarking that the keynote of the lives of every member of the Salvation Army, both officers and those in the ranks, was self-sacrifice, Mr. McLeod went on to describe his impressions of General Booth upon seeing him in Chicago, upon the latter's last trip around the world. He concluded by paying a warm tribute to the new head of the Salvation Army, with the hope that he may be spared until he, too, receive the title of "Grand Old Man."

Rev. Charles Sing.

The Rev. Mr. Sing of the Methodist Church followed along the lines of his brother ministers in offering the tribute of a great religious body at the passing of a man who had filled such a conspicuous place in the religious world for nearly a quarter of a century. Mr. Sing referred to the fact of the late General Booth's having been brought up in the Methodist Church and leaving it with his wife when a young man, feeling that he had a special call and required a wider field than any one denomination would allow him. In conclusion he drew attention to the powerful influence Mrs. Booth always was in shaping the destinies of the Army.

Capt. Tuttle of the S. A.

Captain Tuttle brought this remarkable memorial service to a close, stating that it would be out of place if he as the leading representative of the Army in Prince Rupert did not say a few words in regard to the great master just gone to his reward.

He described the work of the Army, concluding by saying General Booth lived for humanity, and the reference by Mr. Kerr to the late great leader being the prophet of the poor he considered the greatest eulogistic tribute that it was possible to pronounce. General Booth was the greatest organizer of the age, and the Army was bound to live and increase in numbers and usefulness.
