**HOW WOULD A WOMAN DO FOR MAYOR OF PRINCE RUPERT?
SAN DIEGO MAY HAVE ONE**

"If I am elected mayor of San Diego, the city itself will be my home, just as if it were a house on a side street, and the people of the city will be my family."

Gentle of manner, soft voice, handsome in a mature and motherly way, Mrs. Rae Copley Raum, independent candidate for mayor of San Diego, California, is essentially a womanly woman. None of the so-called "suffragettes" here—nothing of the woman who seeks to gain by violence what she considers her rights. Mrs. Raum objects to the term "suffragette" as being in itself antagonistic.

Equality of Sex.

"We haven't suffrage in California," she said; "we have equality, which means that woman has asked for and been granted the right not to be classed with paupers, criminals and the inmates."

Together with her sister, Miss Edith Copley, one of San Diego's

wealthiest and most prominent women, Mrs. Raum is making a transcontinental trip in Miss Copley's automobile. Their trip serves a double purpose—it gives the sisters an opportunity to "see America first," and it also gives Mrs. Raum a respite from the publicity attendant upon her having been tendered the Progressive Republican nomination for mayor. The election takes place in April, but Mrs. Raum and Miss Copley expect to return to San Diego in time for the November primaries. If she is elected she will be the first woman to hold an office of such importance in California.

Not a Suffragette.

"A woman gets nothing except by being gentle and womanly," said Mrs. Raum. "The English women will never get what they want by parading and screaming and breaking windows. The aggressive woman never reaches her desired results, but if she acts in a womanly way men will give her what she wants. She is essentially a wife and mother, and should not go outside of her province. We California women didn't fight for suffrage. We asked for it and it was given to us."

Interest in Politics.

The fact that Mrs. Raum has only lived in San Diego three years, having come to California from Illinois, makes her selection as Progressive candidate the more remarkable. The first intimation she had of her growing importance in the political affairs of her adopted state was when she was informed she had been made a member of the Progressive Republican State Central Committee. Later she was asked to run for Congress, but she declined.

To Tax Bachelors.

"I don't think it would be right or fair for one woman to flaunt her privileges in the faces of women less fortunate," she said. "And until all states have suffrage I do not think there should be women delegates to national conventions or women members of Congress. It is the men of our own state who have granted us these privileges, and not the men of the United States."

One of Mrs. Raum's theories is that all bachelors in a community should be taxed, instead of being permitted to enjoy the benefits of the city in which they live, and contributing nothing to its welfare.

HIGHEST BUILDING IN WORLD

Excluding the Eiffel Tower in Paris, which is the loftiest structure in the world (but not ranked as a building, as it has a skeleton steel construction), the world's highest building is the Woolworth Building in New York, 750 feet. Then come the Metropolitan Life Insurance Building, New York, 700 feet 3 inches; Singer Building, New York, 612 feet; Municipal Building, New York, 560 feet 1 inch; City Hall, Philadelphia, 547 feet; Cologne Cathedral, 510 feet; Bankers Trust Building, Nassau and Wall streets, 539 feet; Strasburg Cathedral, 468 feet; St. Peter's, Rome, 448 feet; Times Building, New York, 419 feet 9 inches; St. Stephen's Cathedral, Vienna, 411 feet. Excluding the Washington Monument, the Heidelberg Building, New York, would rank tenth, with its 410 feet. It was announced some time ago that the Equitable Life Assurance Society had plans prepared to erect an office building 909 feet high on its lots on Broadway, Pine, Nassau, and Cedar streets, New York; but this was an error, as the building is to be 36 stories high, or 19 less than the Metropolitan. It will, however, be the largest office building in the world in point of floor area.
