Apparently the Royals were only toying with the Cornwall club all through the series, the goal summary bears this out.

Joe Lally will now have a chance to tell the folks down by the canal what a great (?) showing his pets made.

Dai Thomas, the former Welsh international rugby star, has not lost any of his old country form.

Jimmy Duffy won the annual Ward marathon at Toronto from a field of fifty. Corkery, Canada's hope in the Olympic marathon at Stockholm, Sweden, dropped out when he was in second place a few miles from the finish.

Manager Wattleit, of the Bees, states that he is going after a winner for next season. If he comes through O. K., the fans are willing to wait.

Tom Longboat, the famous red-skin distance galloper, was after a race with Alf Shrub, in Vancouver, but was unable to find a promoter kind enough to give him dates.

Spokane beat the picked Seattle team 5 to 1 in the third game of the post-season exhibition series.

Matt McGrath, world's champion hammer thrower, added a new world's record in his string at Celtic Park, when he threw the 16-pound hammer with unlimited run and follow 191 feet 5 inches. The former record was 180 feet 1 inch by J. J. Flanagan on the same grounds three years ago.

The B. C. A. A. U. has appointed the following committees: Championship, D. O'Sullivan; registration, Dr. Davidson, M. Oppenheimer, Entries for the Gold Seal road race will close with Mr. Oppenheimer on October 24th.

A draw match was played at the Albion C. C. grounds on Saturday between eleven captained by Mr. E. W. Ismay (Albion) and Fred W. Reeves (Victoria C. C.), respectively. Mr. A. C. B. Gray played a splendid innings, retiring with fifty runs to his credit. He was also in first class form with the ball, taking five out of nine wickets.

The wrestling match between George Walker, amateur middle-weight champion of Canada, and Peter Buzukos, one of the numerous claimants of the world's welterweight title, is scheduled for next Thursday night at Vancouver.

Eleven Northwestern League ball players are members of the .300 fraternity, according to the final averages. The nominal honor goes to "Chick" Hartley, the Philadelphia policeman, turned over to Spokane for Zimmerman by San Francisco. Hartley finished with the fine average of .386, but he took part in less than one-third of the games. Wilson of Seattle comes next with .345, but he also figured in about one-third of his team's games, so the real honor belongs to the veteran, Harry Meek, with .344. Meek led the league practically all season, being at times passed by Wudli, McDowell and others, but always cheerfully regaining lost ground and stinging

the ball at a consistent, steady clip, while rivals slumped.

"Hap" Myers of Spokane made the most hits, the most runs and the most stolen bases of any ball player in the league and ranked second to Meek. If a title could be handed to the man who was of the most value to his team's offense and that title should consider not only batting average, but run getting, Myers would be king. He has Meek outclassed after first base is reached.

Myers' base stealing record smashes any previous performance in Northwestern League history. You have to go back twenty years in the official guide books to find any record to compare with 146 stolen bases, and that includes every league in organized baseball for that time.

Mann of Seattle is the leading slugger. Mann not only got 26 home runs, coming within one of Artie Bues' all-time Northwestern record, but he got a lot of doubles. Strait, also of Seattle, comes next with 20 homers.

SCOTSMEN MAKE BEST PLAYERS

Out of the New Westminster lacrosse team, champions of the world, it has been found that five are Irish descent, two are English-Canadians, while nine are Scotch, with one, Tom Gifford, being born in the land of heather. It has always been suspected that the Irish made the best lacrosse players, but from the lineup of the champions it would seem that the Scotch have some claim. And, strange to say, the two Turnbills are the men who give England as the country from which came their ancestors. That's a Scotch name anyway, so that it looks as if the champions had a clear title to lacrosse honors. As the Scotch have the reputation of hanging on to anything they possess, Cornwall cannot be surprised at the result.

PACKY IS RING WISE AND FAST

Stockyard Champion Never Takes Any Chances of Hurting Hands —Boxes to Save Them.
