## Chief Sues Mayor.

Lethbridge, Oct. 15.—Joseph Gillespie, ex-chief of police, issued a writ against George E. Hatch, mayor; Leslie Sillicker, Patrick Egan and the City of Lethbridge as joint defendants, claiming \$50,000 damages and \$600 special damages for alleged slanderous charges, malicious and wrongful in character, also for imputing misconduct and that he was guilty of criminal offense when chief of police. Mr. Gillespie appeared in person, no lawyer's name being connected with the writ. This is the culmination of the recent police investigation here whereon the ex-chief was charged with various offenses.
