MANY CHANGES MADE IN THE DOMINION CABINET

BULGARIANS CONTINUE TO PRESS THE TURKS AT ADRIANOPLE AND CAPTURE SUPPLIES

BULGARIANS CONTINUE THEIR SUCCESSES IN BALKAN FIGHT

KING GEORGE AND HIS MINISTERS CONFER AS TO BALKAN SITUATION AND BRITISH AND FOREIGN MINISTERS DISCUSS ACTION OF THE POWERS.

Sofia, Oct. 28.—Bulgarian forces, according to despatches received here tonight, captured the towns of Luluebergas and Demotica. It is stated that the Turks are erecting earthworks along the River Erkene, west of Eskibaba.

Bulgarian cavalry succeeded in cutting all communication between Adrianople and Constantinople and also between Adrianople and Macedonia.

The bridge over the Tchortu River at Cherkesskoj has been destroyed by the Turkish soldiers. Non-combatants are being permitted to pass through the allied armies' lines. The commander of the city yesterday asked to surrender, but refused to do so. The Bulgarians are preparing to storm the city and if that is not successful to lay siege to it. The second military train from Constantinople for the front with supplies fell into the hands of the Bulgarians.

London, Oct. 28.—The Balkan situation was the subject of a lengthy conference between the British foreign secretary, Sir Edward Grey, the first lord of the admiralty, Winston Churchill; Balfour, minister of war, and the foreign ministers. A conference as to what action the powers should take in regard to the Balkan war was also held by King George and his ministers.

Lack of Evidence.
W. Thomas, the Greek charged with a serious offense, was on Saturday discharged by Magistrate McMullin, sufficient evidence not being adduced to warrant the case being sent up for trial. The girl in the case, who appears to have been of a loose character, is to be sent back to her parents at Nelson.

Sophia on Last Run.
The Princess Sophia arrived yesterday about 6 p. m. on her scheduled trip to Skagway with a light passenger list, amongst whom were included four members of the R. N. W. M. Police on their way to join the detachment at Dawson. This will be the Princess Sophia's last trip for time being, as she is going to be put on the ways and overhauled and will be transformed from a coal to an oil burner. This will be the first time she has been out of the water since she arrived on this coast, a brand new boat from the Clyde. A change of schedule will take effect, the Princess May continuing to make the Skagway run, the Princess Beatrice and Royal being probably used for the trip here and to Granby Bay.

CABINET CHANGES ANNOUNCED TO FILL OFFICE MONK LEFT

TO FILL MONK'S OFFICE BORDEN MAKES SEVERAL IMPORTANT CHANGES IN THE CABINET—HAS PREPARED FOR NANTSEL'S RESIGNATION, WHICH IS EXPECTED.

Ottawa, Oct. 29.—Occasioned by the resignation of Hon. F. D. Monk because he could not agree with Premier Borden on the matter of the latter's naval policy, a general shuffle has taken place in the cabinet. Coderre, the member for Hochelaga, will be sworn in as secretary of state. Hon. R. Rogers will be transferred

from the ministry of the interior to the ministry of public works. Hon. W. J. Roche, secretary of state, will become the minister of the interior in place of Rogers. Hon. L. P. Pelletier, the postmaster general, will replace Hon. F. D. Monk on the treasury board.

Marchal will join the cabinet later as minister of inland revenue when Nantel, as it has been rumored, resigns that office. His resignation, on the same grounds as Hon. F. D. Monk's, is expected shortly.

LIEUTENANT M'MORDIE WON GOLD MEDAL AT THE RANGE

IN KEENLY CONTESTED SHOOT THE CIVILIANS BEST EARL GREY'S RIFLES BY 46 POINTS—W. J. GREER GETS SILVER AND SRGT. BROWN BRONZE MEDALS.

The long looked forward to Thanksgiving Day rifle shoot was brought off yesterday on the range across the harbor, the two teams representing the Prince Rupert Rifle Association and the Earl Grey's Rifles being on deck bright and early at the wharf to start off for the range and test their prowess as riflemen. There were a few enthusiasts to accompany them, including Captain Fred Stork, the commander of the Earl Grey's Rifles.

Shooting commenced about 10 a. m. and at the end of the shooting for the first range the civilians led by 10 points, the conclusion of the meet leaving them the winners by 46 points. As will be seen by the subjoined scores, the leading men of both teams were pretty evenly matched.

Lieutenant S. P. McMordie, the popular officer of the Earl Grey's, carried off the gold medal with the fine record of 97, much to the delight of the members of the troop. Second place and the silver medal were captured by Joe Greer of the G. T. P. staff with the equally good record of 96. Sergeant Brown, the veteran of South African fame, captured the bronze medal with 94 to his credit.

Altogether the event proved a great success, the weather conditions were first rate, it being a little dark perhaps at the 600 yards range. The silver cup donated for competition by Captain

Fred Stork last year remains a second year in the hands of the civilians, the victors of yesterday's shoot, with the Earl Grey's resting on their laurels as winners of the gold and bronze medals for the first and third highest scores. The scores were:
