ASSIZE COURT CLOSED

on Sale of Liquor to Indians

In closing the assizes yesterday, which Sheriff Shirley declared was an assize of general gaol delivery, not one prisoner being sentenced to imprisonment, Chief Justice Hunter remarked that in his experience nearly all the Indians who appeared before him were there as a result of having indluged too freely in liquor, and he would urge upon the government that the sale of intoxicating liquors to Indians be made an indictable offense, punishable on the second offence with the lash.

The assault case against David Faithful and a companion terminated yesterday morning, being the last case on the list of criminal charges, was dismissed.

Solomon Bright, the only person adjudged guilty by the jury of the charges preferred, was liberated on conditions. He must reimburse the woman he shot, refrain from liquor and aid in the maintenance of law and report regularly to the police as well as to pay a fine.

This being the only guilty party of the twelve accused, and his sentence being suspended, no prisoners will return to the

following: 1. The design of the system: The permanent sewer system is designed as a combined system for sewerage and storm water. It is designed to serve a population of about 110,000 with an average water consumption on 60 gallons per head per day, and with a maximum actual runhours. As it is estimated that areas is about 80 per cent. and in residential areas about 60 per cent., our system is designed to provide for a rainfall of 0.625 inches per hour. The maximum

record for the last four years is 2.58 inches in 12 hours. The "New Form Egg Shaped Culvert" has been adopted. This form of culvert provides "the greatest possible hydraulic mean country by such men as Sir depth" with a minimum flow. Theoretically a four inch pipe with a fall of 1 in 30 would serve 853 persons at a water consumption of 70 gallons per head per day.
