CONTRACT MADE ON A SUNDAY NOT BINDING
Judge Grant Decides Against Man Who Figured on Sabbath

Vancouver, Dec. 5.—Because a carpenter named Bond had visited a house on Sunday to look at a proposed job he was asked to figure on, His Honor Judge Grant dismissed his suit for the recovery of \$68 for the work, holding that the contract was an illegal one, having been entered upon on a Sunday.

The contract in question was the completion of an attic in a house at Grandview for the defendant, Mr. Cox, who had declined to pay the bill, alleging that on Sunday morning when Bond came to look at the work he had told him that it would cost no more than \$50.

The wife of the defendant corroborated her husband's story. On hearing this part of the evidence, His Honor promptly dismissed the case, holding that any contract made on a Sunday was outside the law.

Mr. Cox before the trial had paid the sum of \$50 into court, and his counsel, Mr. Hurley, at once applied to have the money returned, but His Honor declined to make an order for the payment of the money, saying that as the transaction had been an illegal one the court would have nothing at all to do with it.

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TIMES WERE DULL SO MURDER WAS BARGAIN

Detective Offers to Do "Job" at Reduced Rate—Arrested.

Salt Lake City, Utah, Dec. 5.—Fletcher Preston, who represented himself as a private detective, was locked up in the city jail here the other evening after he was said to have offered to kill Alfred Sorenson if he was paid \$2,000.

Sorenson recently was tried and acquitted on the charge of killing Thomas McGillis here last spring. Preston is said by the police to have made a "proposition" to Abe McGillis, a brother of the murdered man, to put Alfred Sorenson out of the way.

Abe McGillis notified the police department of the "proposition" that had been made to him and arrangements were made to trap Preston. Two detectives were hidden in a basement, where Preston was to meet McGillis.

Preston appeared at the appointed hour and repeated his offer, which was overheard by the detectives. The police claim he said things were dull in the detective agency and he could afford to do the job for \$2,000, although his regular price for such work was \$2,500.

The local police say Preston's mind has become unbalanced from reading about the Rosenthal murder case in New York.
