MAYOR NEWTON TOOTS PREVIOUS COUNCIL

that there was plenty of evidence
to show that the changes effected
in the heads of the Fire, Tele-
phone and Electric Light depart-
ments had been decidedly advan-
tageous to the city. In conclu-
sion, he reviewed the work of the
department and assured the elec-
tors that they were all in a high-
ly satisfactory condition with
balances on the right sides.

Alderman Maitland.

Alderman Maitland, who is a
great favorite with an audience,
had a most careful and concise
report prepared to submit to the
meeting, but the exigencies of
time prevented him from more
than reading a few extracts. He
endeavored to show that by the
system of day labor there had
been a saving over any other
that had been tried up to the
present. The Board of Works
had devoted the greatest energy
and zeal to the carrying out of
the work of their department
during the last year.

Alderman Bullock-Webster.

Alderman Bullock-Webster,
who had come armed with a very
official little despatch valise, and

which he opened very solemnly
at about 11:15, much to the per-
turbation of the remnant of the
audience, deplored the fact that
the Mayor's having taken up
nearly two hours of the evening
debarred them from an oppor-
tunity of more than just touch-
ing on the work of the Council
for the past year. He had sup-
ported the Mayor only when he
considered him absolutely in the
right, and, as a matter of fact,
had had numerous differences
with him, in which he was glad
to be able to say he had been
quite able to hold his own. He
complimented the Police depart-
ment, stating that they were
probably as efficient and able a
body of men as the city was ever
likely to possess. Touching the
ridicule that had been attempted
to be heaped upon the Commis-
sioners for so-called playing the
"detective," he explained that he
believed it was their duty to see
for themselves that the work of
the department was properly car-
ried out. They proved to their
entire satisfaction that it was so.
The Park Commission was not
able to accomplish anything
through lack of funds, but they
had made a start by planting a
tree at the time of the visit of the
Duke of Connaught. It took
nearly an hour to narrate the
history of the little deer, and the
inception of the city zoo. Alder-
man Bullock-Webster appears to
be the only citizen who ever took
the matter seriously. He depre-
cated the fact that the local press
had seen fit to ridicule the whole
affair from the start, the unkind-
est cut of all being that the
Mayor's own paper fell in line
and made amusing copy out of
the subject.

Alderman Montgomery.

Alderman Montgomery said
that agitators and drones com-
posed a council as a rule and it
was a good thing to have the
former around to shake things
up a bit.

Alderman Kerr.

Alderman George Kerr wound
up the meeting shortly before
midnight. He remarked that it
was too late for him to make a
speech and advised the audience
that the next time they came to
a council meeting to bring their
blankets with them.

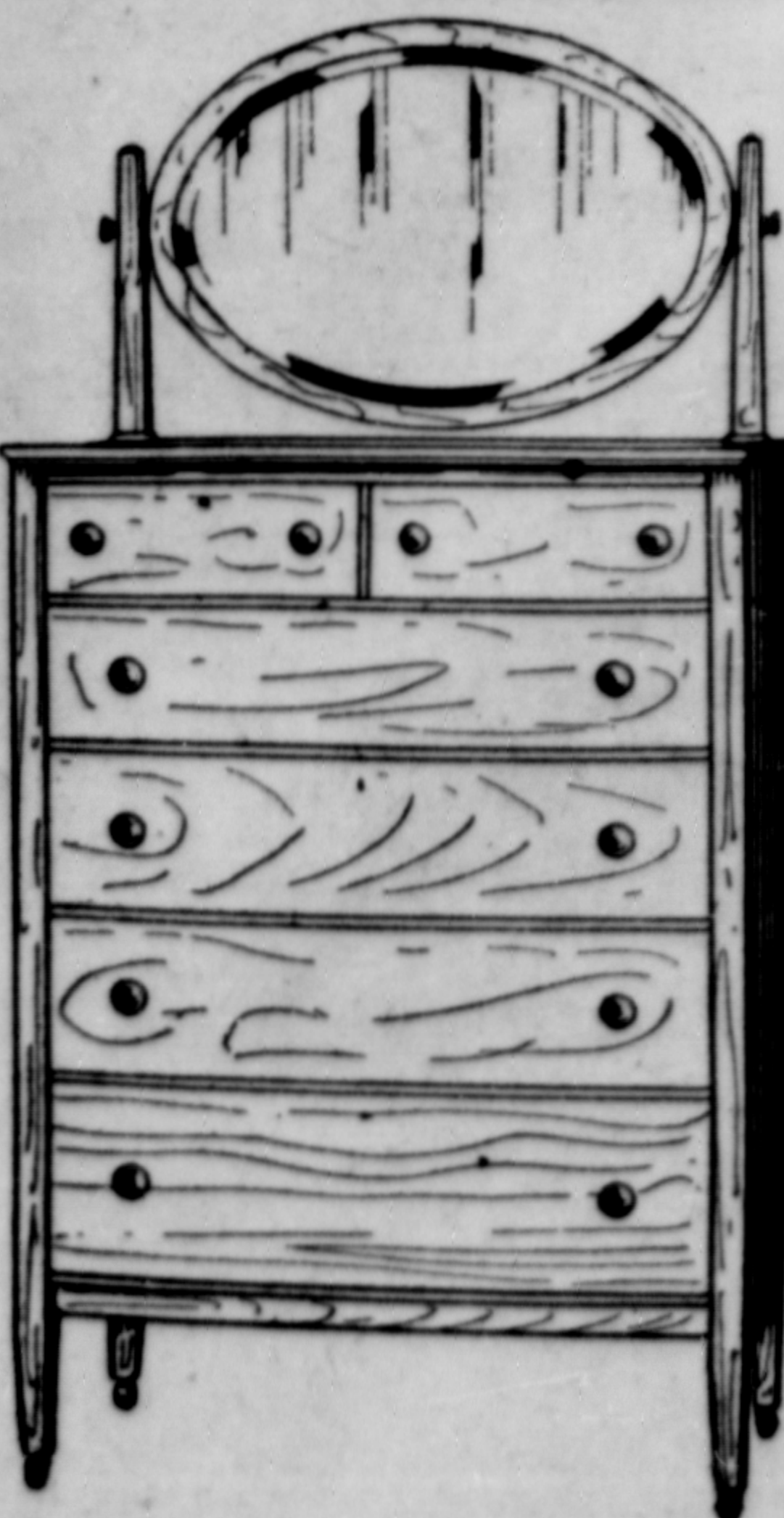
