

ARCHBALD IS GUILTY; STRIPPED OF OFFICE

U. S. Senate Finds Him Guilty of Misusing Position While Federal Judge.

Washington, Jan. 21.—Robert W. Archbald of Scranton, Pa., for twenty-one years an occupant of judicial positions in Pennsylvania, the Federal district bench and the United States commerce court, has been adjudged guilty by the United States Senate of "high crimes and misdemeanors," and is stripped of his office and forever disqualified from holding positions of public honor or public trust.

The conviction and judgment came as the conclusion of the impeachment trial on charges that Judge Archbald had been guilty of misconduct and misbehavior as a judge and that he had used corruptly his judicial power to further the private interests of himself and his friends in the acquisition of coal properties in Pennsylvania.

Upon five of the thirteen separate charges brought against him by the House of Representatives Judge Archbald was found guilty. Upon the other eight the Senate voted him not guilty.

Not Stylish.

FORTY THOUSAND MORE GIRLS OUT

Join the Ranks of the Striking Garment Workers in New York.

New York, Jan. 20.—Fifty thousand flaming red posters distributed in six hundred girls' dress and shirtwaist factories today turned nearly 40,000 workers into the ranks of the strikers in the garment making trades, now numbering nearly 200,000. The posters were the official call for a strike among the dress and waist makers, who had previously sanctioned such action by an overwhelming vote. All of these employees are girls, some of them under fourteen years of age, and their organizations have appointed committees to guard the idle workers against the agents of the white slave trade. The first demand of the dress and shirt makers is: "No locked doors." They declare that the lesson taught in the Asch building fire, in which 147 girls lost their lives, has not been heeded and that they are forced to work in unsafe and insanitary shops.

Inquest this Afternoon.

An inquest will be held this afternoon by Coroner McMullin on the body of Abel Ryan, the Indian found drowned yesterday morning alongside the Rupert Marine Iron Works dock. Nothing further has transpired to throw any light upon the sad affair. The fact that a sum of money the deceased was known to have brought with him from Port Simpson was found intact in a pocket of some clothing that he had left on board his boat does away with any suggestion that might possibly have been made of the unfortunate man being a victim of foul play. Exactly how he came to meet his death by drowning will probably never be known.
