NO IMMEDIATE HOPE FOR CANCER PATIENTS

Alleged Discovery Is Not Regarded as Successful.

Copenhagen, Jan. 25.—In view of the statement regarding the cancer discovery made by Mr. Haaland at the Imperial Cancer Research Fund laboratory that hematooids cannot be transferred from rat to rat, that they go through a stage of development in cockroaches which are infected by eating the excrement of sick rats, which excrement contains the eggs of nematoids, and that in cockroaches the eggs develop, and when cockroaches are eaten by rats the cancer swellings appear—it is as yet problematical if the discovery will be of importance for human cancer. In any case it cannot be used to fight all sorts of cancer. Experiments are continuing but will take a long time, therefore there is no immediate hope for cancer patients.

New Chart of Masset Sound and Inlet Has Been Issued

A chart, in colors, of Masset sound and inlet, numbered 305 of the Canadian Hydrographic Survey, has just been published by the Hydrographic Survey, Department of the Naval Service of Canada. Copies may be obtained from the Hydrographic Survey Office, Department of the Naval Service, Ottawa, and from the agent of the Department of Marine and Fisheries at Victoria for 15 cents per copy, payable in advance.

According to an official notice just received a new light was to have been established about Jan. 5th on Barren Island, Dixon Entrance, the character of the light to be a white acetylene light showing one flash every five seconds. Latitude N. 54 degrees, 14 minutes 35 seconds, Long. W. 131 degrees, 21 minutes 10 seconds.

MORE PRECAUTIONS TO PREVENT PLAQUES

Ottawa, Jan. 25.—As an additional precaution against bubonic plague an order in council has been passed providing that vessels coming to Canada from infected ports must be docked not less than six feet from any Canadian wharf and must not be fastened to the wharf by hawsers unless they are equipped with rat guards at least three feet in diameter to prevent the rodents from bringing the disease to the shore.
