GLADSTONE'S PREDICTION

Prophecy of Third of Century Ago That Seems Near Fulfillment

In a speech at Edinburgh on November 29, 1879, the late Rt. Hon. W. E. Gladstone made the following prediction regarding the disposal of the territory in the Balkans:

"I wish to avail myself of this occasion for the purpose of clearly putting and clearing answering one question of vast importance. Who is it that ought to possess, who is it that ought to sway, those rich and fertile countries which are known as comprising what is called the Balkan Peninsula?"

"It seems to be agreed that the time has come, that the hour is about to strike, if it has not already struck, when all sway of Turkish power over those fair provinces must cease, if it were only by reason of impotence. Who, then, is to have the succession to Turkey? From the bottom of my heart, and with the fullest conviction of my understanding, I will give you the reply—a reply which I am perfectly certain will awaken a free and generous, a unanimous echo in your bosoms. That succession is not to pass to Russia. It is not to pass to Austria. It is not to pass to England, under whatever name of Anglo-Turkish convention or anything else. It is to pass to the people of these countries; to those who have inhabited them for many long centuries; to those who have reared them to a state of civilization when the great calamity of Ottoman conquest spread like a wild wave over that portion of the earth and buried that civilization under its overwhelming force."
