CONNAUGHT CUP RULES

Trophy is Given to Teams from
Any Skating Club in the
World.

Ottawa, Feb. 10.—His Royal
Highness the Duke of Connaught
has placed in the hands of the
Minto Club the deed of gift for
the Connaught cup, the first com-
petition for which will be held
under the auspices of the Minto
Skating Club in the Arena on
February 13th and 14th. The
opening paragraph reads: "With
a view to the general encourage-
ment and development of skat-
ing, in combination by pairs and
individuals, and more particu-
larly with a view to the encour-
agement and development of com-
bined skating along the lines at
present approved by the National
Skating Association of Great
Britain, in the general style and
pose approved by the Interna-
tional Skating Union, His Royal
Highness the Duke of Connaught,
governor general of Canada,
hereby gives and assigns to the
trustees hereinafter mentioned,
and their successors in trust, a
trophy, to be held by them upon
the following conditions," etc.
The trophy is vested in a board
of three trustees, to consist of
the official secretary of the Gov-
ernor General, now Colonel Low-
ther, and two representatives ap-
pointed annually by the executive
of the Minto Club, at present
General MacKenzie and Mr. John
Thompson.

The competition is open to
two teams of four, consisting of two
ladies and two gentlemen, from
any recognized skating club in
the world, but all must be bona
fide resident members of one
club. Qualification as an ama-
teur according to the definition
of the National Skating Union of
Great Britain must be shown to
the satisfaction of the trustees.
The competitions will be held
in Ottawa only, and at least once
in every two years. The trophy
shall remain in the possession of
the winning club until the next
competition. Even if only one
team enters it can be adjudged
the winner by skating the pro-
gramme stipulated.

At least three, and not more
than seven, judges must be se-
lected by the trustees for the
competitions, either from ama-
teur or professional skaters.
All expenses incidental to the
competition, including the pro-
viding of individual prizes for the
winning team, are to be provided
by the Minto Club.

Listens Like Big Bout.

Chicago, Feb. 10. — Frank
Gotch, champion heavyweight
wrestler of the world, is about to
emerge from retirement. He
came to Chicago the other day to
referee a wrestling bout, and in-
cidentally he admitted that he
was about ready again to answer
the lure of the mat. "If there is
a public demand that I wrestle
again, I'll come back," he said.
"I might even wrestle some one I
already have beaten, if the sport-
ing public thinks I should in or-
der to make my superiority con-
clusive. But I'm not anxious to
get back into active training."
Gotch is at present in business
in Humboldt, Iowa. Mrs. Gotch
is opposed to his re-entering the
game. Just when Gotch would
wrestle, if he should decide to
come back, has not been stated.
It is generally believed, however,
that Zbyszko would get the match.

AMERICAN PACKAGES MUCH
HEAVIER THAN CANADIAN

Dawson, Feb. 8. — Packages
mailed in the United States under
the new parcels post arrange-
ments are entitled to come
through to Dawson. Canada
transmits packages weighing no
more than four pounds. The
American packages will be car-
ried if weighing eleven pounds
or under, the same as those origi-
nating in England. A good many
parcels of eleven pounds or un-
der have arrived here from Eng-
land for years past.

The first American declaration
form under the parcels post for
goods for another country ar-
rived here on a small parcel from
Fairbanks, showing the estab-
lishment of the service there.
The form is made on a shipping
tag, attached to the package, and
must bear the declaration of the
owner of the nature of the con-
tents and their exact value.

This simplifies the work for
the Customs Department. How-
ever, if the customs house should
desire, it has the right to inspect
the goods the same as under the
express or freight system.

Eagerness for Gold Cure Will
Cost Mr. Porker His Life.

Canonsburg, Pa., Feb. 10.—
While leaning over the side of a
pig pen to get a good look at an
especially fine porker on the farm
of W. A. Hallam, near this city,
Charles V. Keller, a noted poultry
fancier of Winamac, Indiana,
dropped his \$200 watch into the
feed trough and a hog promptly
swallowed it. Judge Keller then
bought the hog for \$100 and
shipped it to Winamac, where
he will butcher it and recover his
watch. Keller is the judge who,
while passing on the merits of a
prize hen in a western show last
fall, had the misfortune to have
a large sized diamond pecked
from its setting in a ring.

SPASM OF THE THROAT

Abruptly Terminated Examination
of Rockefeller Before the
Committee.

Jekyll Island, Ga., Feb. 10.—A
spasm of the throat that left
William Rockefeller a straggling,
trembling old man, on the verge
of nervous collapse, abruptly ter-
minated his examination by
Chairman Pujo and Counsel
Samuel Untermyer, of the House
money trust committee, here.
Mr. Rockefeller was asked just
four questions, all practically
immaterial, before the attack
forced conclusion of the hearing.
The aged Standard Oil magnate
was closeted with the committee-
men for only twelve minutes. At
the end of the time he was as-
sisted to his couch by Dr. Walter
F. Chappelle, his physician, who
declared his patient exhausted.

USED CLEVER RUSE
TO ROB SKIPPER

St. Helens, Ore., Feb. 8.—"All
hands forward to man the gang
plank; an officer to come aboard."
This vigorous shout from off
shore early today while the
steamer Yosemite was preparing
to put off for San Francisco re-
sulted in the crew stepping lively
to assist the supposed officer
aboard.

Shortly afterward Captain As-
plund missed \$540 from his quar-
ters. An hour later William
Moriarty, a paroled convict, was
arrested for the alleged theft of
the money, and will be returned
to the Salem penitentiary to serve
out an unexpired term. The
money was recovered.

San Francisco, Feb. 10.—
James Coffroth announced the
other evening that both Ad. Wol-
gast and Tommy Murphy had ac-
cepted terms for a twenty round
match here on Washington's
Birthday, February 22nd. Joe

him to cancel all arrangements
and Wolgast has been substi-
