BRITAIN BUILT MORE SHIPS
THAN ALL OTHER NATIONS

ESTABLISHED NEW WORLD'S RECORD FOR CONSTRUCTION
IN 1912—UNITED STATES SECOND IN PERCENT-
AGE INCREASE.

London, Feb. 10.—In the mat-
ter of ship construction Great
Britain established a world's
record in 1912, according to the
statistical report issued by
Lloyd's. On December 31st, 1,-
970,650 tons of merchant ship-
ping alone were built, and this
was 451,000 tons more than on the
corresponding day of 1911. The output by Great Britain dur-
ing the year, in fact, was more
than the entire production of all
other nations combined.

The United Kingdom percent-
age of merchant vessels launched
was 68 in 1911, and 60 in 1902.
The world's output is the larg-
est ever known and in foreign
ship yards a record was estab-
lished by the launching of 317,-
000 tons of merchant vessels in
excess of tonnage put into the
water in the next best year, 1911.

The largest foreign individual
increases for the year are:
United States, 68 per cent.; Ger-
many, 50 per cent., and Italy, 40
per cent.

The total output of sailing ves-
sels in 1912 in the whole world
was only 105,901 tons, but ex-
cluding barges, lighters and sim-
ilar crafts, the gross tonnage of
sea going sailing vessels launched
in 1912 does not exceed 25,000.

SOME SUGGESTIONS
FOR READING ROOM

Local Societies Might Assist in
Furnishing by Donating
Suitable Pictures.

The reading room committee
appointed by the Council have
held a couple of meetings and
have prepared estimates, and in
all probability within a few
weeks everything will be in
readiness for the opening of the
free civic reading room. The
purpose is to begin with a read-
ing room, in which a large num-
ber of the current magazines,
newspapers and reviews will be
placed. But without doubt a li-
brary will soon be developed in
connection with it. Already a
collection of fifty books has been
offered as a nucleus by one citi-
zen. A member of the commit-
tee has suggested that pictures
might be presented by the citi-
zens and local organizations to
be placed in the reading room as
soon as opened. The Overseas
Club, he said, might wish to do-
nate a picture of King George for
the place of honor; St. An-
drew's Society would want a place
for the Scottish national bard; a
few flags from the Daughters of
the Empire would add to the ef-
fect; the Board of Trade might
have a collection of pictures
representing the industries in the
whole surrounding district, while
some individual alderman might
contribute a pictorial tablet in
memory of the first inmate of
our zoo. By such hearty co-opera-
tion on the part of our citizens
the reading room will become
one of the most attractive and
popular resorts in the city.

ENTRY LIST FOR

Toledo, O., Feb. 12.—Accord-
ing to the official figures fur-
nished by Secretary Abe Lang-
try, the thirteenth annual tour-
ament of the American Bowling
Congress, to open in this city
February 25th, has 530 five man
teams entered, also 1,165 two
man teams, and 2,367 individuals,
and the total entrance money
amounts to \$56,060. Of this sum
\$24,000 will go as prize money.

Victoria, Feb. 12.—A fifteen
round boxing contest between
Joe Bayley, lightweight cham-
pion of Canada, and Kid Dobie
in Nanaimo early in March is in
sight. Morris Condon, manager
