SIX MEN TEAMS AGAIN IN EASTERN CANADA

National Hockey Association will Meet tomorrow to Make Change

Vancouver, Feb. 13.—The National Hockey Association will revert to six-man hockey again. After only one week of the seven men style the Eastern league has about decided that the old system is out of date and the teams will go back to the style in vogue the first half of the present season. According to advices from the east every team down there with the exception of the Ottawa is in favor of the six men game and even the Senators are divided amongst themselves.

An Eastern critic explains why. He declares that the ice surfaces are not large enough for seven-men hockey, as the game is played today. Seven-men hockey was all right in the days when the point never went over the half-way mark and the cover point scarcely ever ventured out that far; when the point used to "lift" the puck from his own stamping ground to the other end of the rink, and, perhaps, score a lucky goal. But that day has gone by in professional hockey and there is no indication of its immediate return.

In the old game the three forwards in a line, with the rover behind them, came skating down the ice, passing and re-passing the puck to defeat the defence. Do they do that today? They do not. Why not? Because, frankly, with teams of even strength they can't play that sort of game because the forwards check back. The development of the checking back game and the development of the attacking defence game has thrown the old ideas of combination right out of gear. Incidentally, also, it has made the ice sheet too small for the seven-men style.

It would not be surprising to see the six-men game adopted on the coast next season. Frank Patrick, when asked what he thought of it today, admitted that the six-men game is spectacular but he pointed out that much spectacular hockey has been seen on the coast with the seven-men teams. It seems to be largely the calibre of the men employed, though Frank admits that the close checking of the professionals of today makes the ice look rather crowded at times. In the old days the amateurs never kept in the same sort of condition as the professionals of today do and they were unable to do so much checking back.

TORONTO MAY SEE STANLEY CUP GAMES

Suggestion for Contests on Artificial Ice Taken Up by Trustee Foran

Ottawa, Feb. 13.—It is not improbable that Toronto people will

witness a great series for the Stanley cup and the hockey championship of the world at the close of the present league season in the National Association and the British Columbia League.

Stanley Cup Trustee William Foran stated last night that the trustees will take up the suggestion with the winners of the N.H.A. with a view to having the games played in Toronto. He thinks the idea is a good one and believes there will be no difficulty in making the arrangements. The rules of the Stanley Cup stipulate that matches should be played on the ice of the defending club, but Mr. Foran states that they may be played anywhere, providing the defending club agrees. If the series materializes it will be the first ever played on neutral or artificial ice. The trustees are very much in favor of having the series played this winter, rather than carry it over until next fall. The latter scheme has never found favor. The Maritime Hockey League will challenge, and they, too, will be accommodated. Their league closes on Feb. 28, and they will probably play at Montreal or Quebec.

JONES AND WOLGAST ARE NEAR TO A SPLIT

Los Angeles, Feb. 13.—Former lightweight champion Ad Wolgast and his manager throughout his reign, Tom Jones, are on the verge of a split today, according to a message received here from Wolgast, who is at Portland, Oregon.

The message said that Jones, who is in Chicago, demands that Wolgast cancel his Feb. 22nd match with Harlem Tommy Murphy in San Francisco. The former champion declared that he replied to Jones' demand with a statement announcing that the services of the manager are no longer required.

CANADIANS CHALLENGE FOR THE DAVIS CUP

Toronto, Feb. 13.—The Canadian Lawn Tennis Association has cabled a challenge for the Davis Cup, emblematic of the championship of the world. They may not send a team, but wished to send their challenge in before the list closed.
