Wants Stricter Law.

Toronto, Feb. 13.—"Wife de-
sertion should be made a deport-
able offence," said Controller
McCarthy to the Board of Con-
trol, but the government will not
deport them. Last year the po-
lice sent \$9,000 to wives who had
been deserted, the money being
collected from husbands who were
found to be residents of this
city. The controllers agreed and
a request will be sent to the gov-
ernment.

small blaze which had started
the automatic sprinklers, but
which was caught so quickly
that it did little damage.

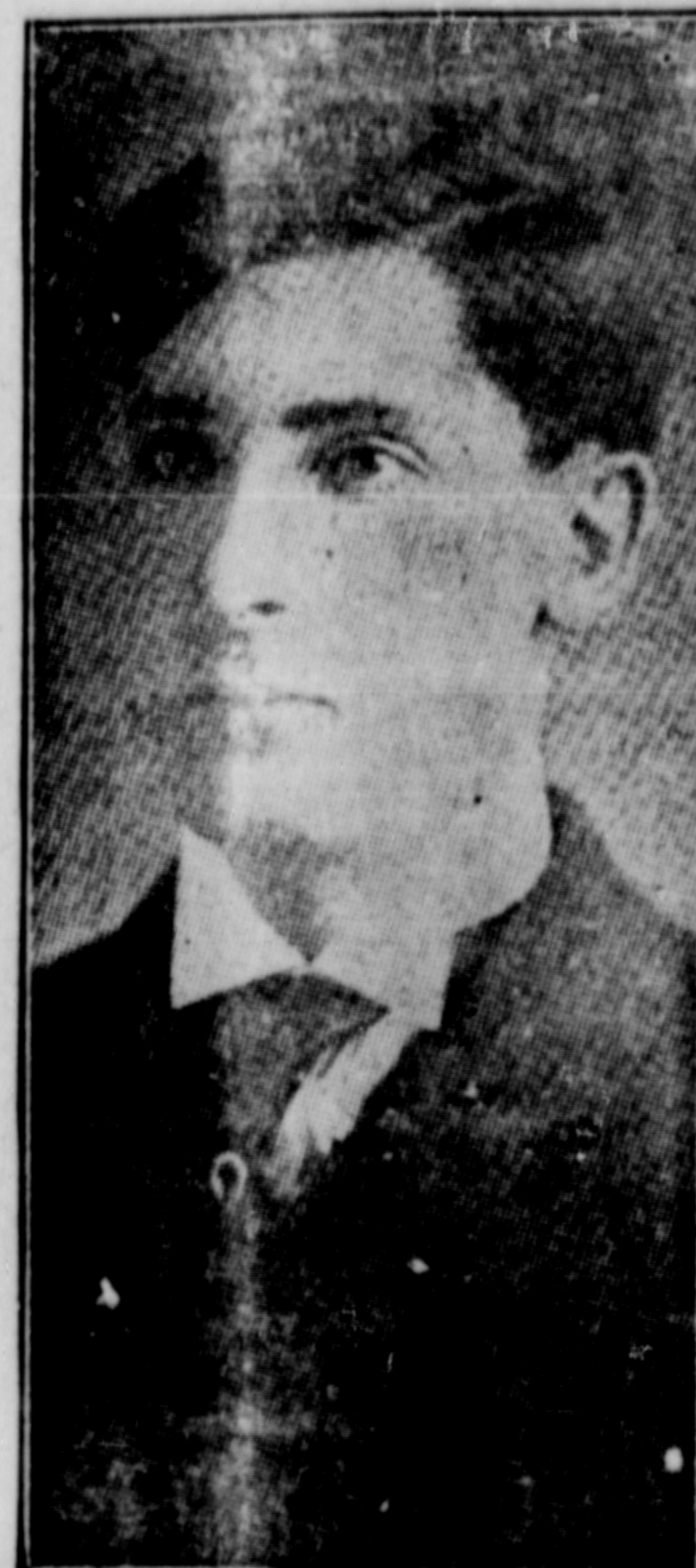

LOCAL BROTHERHOOD OF LOCOMOTIVE ENGINEERS

Branch Organized This Week by
the General Chairman for
Grand Trunk System.

Mr. Murdoch McKenzie, chair-
man of the Brotherhood of Loco-
motive Engineers throughout the
extent of the G. T. P. Railway
system, who arrived in the city
last Wednesday from his head-
quarters at Norwood Grove, Man-
itoba, has been successful in
organizing a branch of the order
in Prince Rupert. Some fifteen
members of the organization have
become associated with the new
lodge. In order to do this many
of them will have to withdraw
from the branches with which
they have been connected in the
past. Mr. McKenzie will leave
for the south this evening on the
Princess May.

FAST BEDS OF COAL DESTROYED BY FIRE

Grand Forks, N. D., Feb. 14.—
Hundreds of thousands of tons
of coal are being consumed in
Western North Dakota by fires
which are burning in undeveloped
mines, and action will probably
be taken by the State Legislature
to halt this wanton destruction
of the state's natural resources.
Evidence regarding the destruc-
tion of lignite coal by slow fires
was received at a hearing to in-
vestigate the possibilities of this
North Dakota coal. The state
geologist reported that there are
approximately 32,000 square
miles of coal beds in this state,
with an estimate tonnage of
500,000,000 tons. "The burn-
ing bluffs" along the Missouri
River and over the western part
of the state are mentioned as far
back as the reports of the Lewis
and Clark expedition, while old-
time inhabitants declare that many of
these "burning bluffs," or lignite
beds, have been smouldering ever
since they came to the territory.
Miners claim that the fires can
be extinguished and there is a
movement on foot to turn the
task over to an experienced en-
gineer.
