came as somewhat of a surprise to his friends, owing to the fact that he had been confined to the hospital but a short time, nevertheless it was not wholly unexpected as he had been ailing for some time.

The death of Captain Walbran removes one of the oldest mariners in British Columbia and his passing will be a great loss to Canada's shipping. There is no question but that Captain Walbran was the best informed navigator in regard to the coast line of this western province. It is almost certain that had not death overtaken Captain Walbran the Dominion government would have seen fit to appoint him wreck commissioner for British Columbia, which position was made vacant by the death of Captain James Gaudin. He was highly qualified for that position owing to his associations here.

FAILED TO ARRIVE

William Manson, M. P. P., was at the wharf this morning on the arrival of the Prince George to meet Mr. A. A. Cox, the architect engaged to draw up the plans for the proposed government buildings. TELEPHONE SYSTEM TO WORK THE G. T. P.

It Will Be Extended to Fitzhugh, B. C., Early This Year.

Winnipeg, March 31.—It is the intention of the Grand Trunk Pacific to install a telephone system from Edmonton through to the Pacific Coast for the operation of trains and the handling of commercial messages.

As soon as spring opens up, the company will start concentrating their efforts on getting this permanent installation in from Edmonton to Fitzhugh, B. C. This will be the farthest point reached this year with a telephone system, but next year the work will be completed to the coast.

The Superior branch of the Grand Trunk Pacific is being run by telephone and is giving the company eminent satisfaction.

ENGLISH CUP SEMI-FINAL

To Be Played Between Sunderland and Burnley Today.

London, March 31.—The replayed semi-final game between Sunderland and Burnley, which resulted on Saturday in a scoreless draw, will take place on Wednesday next at Birmingham. The winner of this game will meet Aston Villa at the Crystal Palace, London, April 19, in the final.

Threshes Standing Grain

Kansas City, Kan., March 29.—C. C. Baldwin, of New York, has invented a machine that threshes standing grain in the field without cutting. Four horses push the machine over the field, and a small gasoline engine drives the thrasher. It only requires two men to operate, one to drive the horse and the other to tend the machine and tie the grain sacks. In a trial the machine threshed twenty-five to thirty acres in a day of ten hours.

To Develop Empire Oil Fields

London, March 29.—Prof. V. B. Lewis, speaking for the demand for oil, which is in excess of the supply, is strongly advocating that encouragement should be given to the oil fields of Canada and of other parts of the Empire, such as the East Indies, where oil is to be found, and the development of the oil fields within the Empire.
