Ottawa, June 2.—The Grand Trunk Pacific, in conjunction with the Grand Trunk Townsite Company, has filed a motion of appeal to the governor-in-council against the judgment delivered by the board of railway commissioners recently in the Fort George townsite case.

Big Hotel for Fort George

The Grand Trunk Pacific Railway will build a \$200,000 hotel on their townsite at Fort George, and work will commence on the construction of this splendid hostelry as soon as the material can be landed on the ground. They will also build a slightly smaller hotel, on similar plans, on their townsite at Willow River, 25 miles up the Fraser river from this point.

ROSS RESOLUTION OF LIBERAL CONVENTION

Senator Sir George Ross Congratulated on Stand He Took on Naval Bill.

At the Revelstoke Liberal convention the following resolution was sent to Senator Sir George Ross:

"The Liberals of British Columbia in convention assembled desire to congratulate you on the high imperial and Canadian stand which you have taken on the navy question. We unhesitatingly condemn the policy of contribution which has been described by Sir Charles Tupper as 'preposterous and dangerous,' by Hon. George E. Foster as bearing the aspect of having somebody else do what we ourselves ought to do, and by Rt. Hon. R. L. Borden as bound to conduce, if anything could conduce, to severing the present connection between Canada and the Empire."

"We believe with the Liberal party throughout the length and breadth of Canada that it is the duty of the Canadian people to support the Empire in case of stress, not merely with empty ships but with our services and our lives, and that any other policy is un-Canadian, un-British and in every way ignoble and worthy of contempt."

"The proper, constitutional and natural defence of the Dominion of Canada calls for the creation of a Canadian navy for service on both oceans. And no policy should be adopted by the parliament of Canada without the express approval of the Canadian people."
