MILITANTS ARE MAD

One of the militant suffragettes died this week, her death being caused by the craziest action that could ever enter a mad woman's brain. The idea of a woman being able to stop a race horse going at the speed of an express train! They are all mad, these militant suffragettes, mad as March hares. There is no doubt about it at all. They want the vote; therefore they will poison a prize dog. They want the vote; therefore they will, if possible, kill the Derby winner. They want the vote; therefore they will kidnap one of the children of one of the warmest advocates of woman suffrage. They want the vote; therefore they will destroy the National Gallery. It is no answer to the claim that these women are mad to say they are quite sane in other respects. Assistance to the Grand Trunk Pacific and Canadian Northern no doubt is necessary to enable the completion of those systems at an early date, but they should have been treated alike. The financial operations of the C. P. R. and Grand Trunk companies are well known, but a mystery surrounds the ramifications and methods of the two knights who have accomplished so much on the friendly foundation of public credit and subsidies.

Premier Borden now has a chance to let the people decide. Things are sometimes prized less when they come within easy reach.

MAY MAKE BRICKS AT
KITSUMKALUM SOON

Possibilities of Clay Deposits
There Being Inspected With
This End in View.

To consider the advisability of erecting a brick making plant at Kitsumkalum, Mr. J. Christiansen of this city, accompanied by Mr. I. I. King, proprietor and manager of the new brick plant at Granby Bay took train for Kitsumkalum this morning. Mr. King, who is a practical brick man has arranged to supply the Granby Smelting, Mining & Power Company. The boilers have been already installed. The brick making machine is expected to arrive at Granby next week. Ten days after its installation he expects to be turning out forty thousand bricks a week.

While awaiting the arrival of the boilers Mr. King has had a little spare time. Accordingly he came here on Sunday, and since then has discussed with Mr. Christiansen and other local men who are interested the possibilities of a brick plant at Kitsumkalum, where Mr. Christiansen owns property containing some good clay deposits. About the quality of the clay there is no doubt. It is its quantity that Messrs. Christiansen and King are anxious to determine, that they may judge whether it is sufficient to warrant the establishment of a plant.

Garage for Fort George.

Fred Peters, a former stage driver for the British Columbia Express Company, arrived here yesterday from Ashcroft in a six passenger Winton touring car, coming the entire distance from Ashcroft in it over the road. Mr. Peters intends to start a garage here and the other town. —Fort George Herald.

Strike Delays Service.

Detroit, Mich., June 7.—Twelve hundred shop employees of the Pere Marquette Railway are on strike as a result of the company's refusal to grant an increase in wages. Freight service is delayed and in some cases passenger traffic has been seriously retarded.

GRAGANOUR JOCKEY
MAY BE EXPELLED

While Riding Derby Favorite He
Bumped Into Aboyeur, Which
Was Given the Prize.

London, June 9.—Bitter condemnatory criticism is heard on all sides today of the methods of Johnny Reiff, who sent Graganour bumping and pushing into Aboyeur in the Derby and made the great classic what one paper terms "a nasty blot on the records of our national sportsmanship." The inquiry by the stewards of the jockey club is still under way and there seems a strong likelihood of Reiff being set down from the English tracks, especially as there are some very peculiar rumors afloat.

Sporting writers are clamorous for the disciplining of the jockey. The Pall Mall Gazette says: "Whether Reiff was to blame or not is a matter of vital importance to the thousands of race goers and to a greater extent of the prestige of the sport of kings. If, in the stewards' opinions, Reiff was physically unable to keep his mount straight and prevent the interference, justice demands that publicity should be given to the fact."

Sporting Life inquires why Reiff, who must be held accountable for the favorite's weird behavior, has gone free thus far and the Westminster Gazette says the jockey's conduct was of a character impossible to overlook.
