WHAT OUR DRY DOCK WILL LOOK LIKE.

What our dry dock will look like when completed and the extensive plans in connection therewith carried out is referred to in the Canadian Municipal Journal, which states: "It will probably take ten years to complete the whole works as planned, for they include berths for the big ocean liners. ship yards, lumber yards, machine shops, saw mill, ore elevators and other aids to industries. The plans are sufficiently comprehensive to meet all the requirements of a city of many thousand people."

The dry dock and its adjuncts were planned years ago by men of famous ability and in a position to accurately guage what this port will require as soon as steel reaches here and the great Oriental seal traffic sets in. But soon after that it is probable that even these extensive plans will be found inadequate to meet all the requirements of the commerce with Europe through the Panama Canal, the golden argosies from Alaska, the silk laden ships of China and Japan, the grain steamers from Russia, the big freighters from our sister dominions of Australia and New Zealand and the ocean tramps of the world. For this is mapped out to be a world port, and one of the most prominent of the world.




