ALWAYS PARTY BEFORE FACTS.

The morning party organ devoted a couple of columns on Sunday to the refutation of a paragraph in the last issue of the Daily News, to the effect the government had granted to the Grand Trunk Pacific a grudging loan and to the Canadian Northern a generous gift, and says: "The ministry has taken pains to see that each company concerned is dealt with on an equal basis." Seen through the yellow spectacles of political partisanship, a loan and a gift may possibly appear equal Also, there is presented as a powerful argument what Hon. George P. Graham, minister of railways in the Laurier cabinet is reported to have said on the subject, and these are clinchers. To show that Mr. Graham was satisfied the party organ quotes: "There were no figures to prove that the Northern Pacific needed aid." It then goes on to say that "the Canadian Northern in turn (for the \$15,640,000) was to transfer to the government its common stock to the value of \$7,000,000. Although not on the market at present, this stock was of value." This is the point: Of what value? Is it at par "although not on the market at present?" The government guaranteed bonds from Edmonton to Yellowhead Pass says the party organ, sold at 87.

bill. These were as follows: Hon. Mr. Oliver-That an equalization of freight rates between Eastern and Western Canada be made a condition of the grant.

Mr. E. M. Macdonald-That the rates over the whole system be subject to the Railway Commission, and that rates to Canadian ports be no higher than to American ports.

Mr. German-That any advance be repayable half yearly with interest at 4 per cent., secured by both parent and subsidiary companies and by common stock to the extent of \$15,-640,000, the amount of the loan.

Each and every one of these amendments were defeated, and the result of these votes leaves no doubt as to which party is for the "interests" and which for the people.
