DROPS DEAD AT HIS DESK

Mr. Walter Sparrow Victim o Aploplexy.

Vancouver, June 23 .- Stricken by aploplexy, Mr. Walter Sparrow, a well known resident of this city, yesterday dropped dead in Mr. Simon Leiser's office.

The deceased, who was about 57 years old, had been in poor health for some time. He was a native of Colborne, Ont., and came here in 1862 with his father, who for many years was la bookkeeper for Pendray & Sons, passing away a number of years ago. He received his education in Victoria, and when a young man left here for Oregon, where he resided for some time, returning here twenty-five years ago and taking a position as bookkeeper with Simon Leiser & Co., which he held until his death.
