STRUCK A TINY FLOW OF OIL ACCIDENTALLY

Men Employed by Graham Island Coal and Timber Syndicate Were Drilling for Coal.

The somewhat startling but not unexpected announcement was made Island Coal & Timber Syndicate had struck a flow of oil. This information was partly corroborated by General Manager Wright upon his arrival here, but he added that the drill only penetrated a small chuck hole in which there was a small amount of oil of seemingly good quality. It was not a "gusher" by any means, but it is considered a good indication of an oil field and Mr. Wright believes that it will be found not very far below. His company, however, is boring for coal, but a strike of oil would be just as acceptable if not more so
