These are the women whose daring escapades have made the "Cat and Mouse" Act a complete failure. The authorities force the hunger striking suffragettes out of jail but keep a string on them with the label "Prisoner's temporary discharge for ill health." As soon as they are released they are again making trouble, are again arrested within a week, do another turn at hunger striking, are then released, and so on ad absurdum. On Monday, as told in our despatches, Mrs. Pankhurst, a leading militant, only a few days before at death's door in Holloway was arrested.

TO WIN BY DEFAULT

England May Keep International Motor Boat Trophy.

New York, July 21.—Fear that the British international trophy for motor boats may be kept in England another year through default of American challengers to get any American boat across to British waters in time for the cup race is now being taken seriously. Another chapter of accidents spoiled the trial of speed boats, which was set for yesterday afternoon off Long Island. The Neptune II, which enthusiasts expected to show in challenge form, was unable to leave her moorings because of a broken engine. The Hazel II also had a slight mishap which prevented any fast going, leaving the American, the only other trial boat, to tune up alone.

U. Ryley, land commissioner for the G. T. He also stated that the G. T. P. had also chosen the name Bulkley and had it accepted for another point farther east.
