PLAYERS DISGUISED AS GIRLS CAUSES A RIOT

Boy Started Rumpus by Snatching Golden Locks from Head of Centre Fielder.

Washington, July 21.—One policeman is in the hospital, two others are nursing bruises and awaiting new uniforms and part of the Union League baseball park is a wreck today as a result of a riot at Sunday's baseball game when 4000 enthusiasts discovered a team of "bloomer" girls were men in disguise.

The team was taken to an east bound train under police protection. A half hour before the storm the manager of the "girls" acquired the gate receipts and had disappeared.

The team was so successful here four weeks ago that it returned for a second appearance, the opposing team being an amateur organization from Janel, M. D. The trouble began when the "girls" centerfielder, a husky young blonde, threw a ball from deep centre to the home plate, catching the runner. The spectators grew suspicious.

A moment later a boy slipped up behind the supposed divinity at third base and gave her golden locks a vigorous pull. They came away, revealing a chunky young man with an elaborate make-up, ending just about his eyebrows. The team fled through a storm of bottles and bricks to the shelter of the clubhouse, where the police massed.

The crowd then stormed the ticket windows, demanding their money back, venting their ire on the park property.

Several persons were hurt and a number of arrests made.

Sir Thomas. "I don't need one. See the captain. He's an old friend of mine."

So Mr. Newey, willing to give the unknown gentleman the benefit of the doubt, saw the captain. "Do you know a gentleman here," he asked, "who calls himself Sir Thomas Lipton?"

"What?" said Captain Donald. "Sir Thomas Lipton? Tut, man, nonsense."

And so the importance of Sir Thomas was not recognized on board the steamer. As it was not deemed wise, however, to dump the King's friend into the Pacific, the multimillionaire was not further molested until he reached Prince Rupert. Then a notice of his arrival was given, not to the mayor and council, or to the Board of Trade, but to Chief Vickers.

There was no trouble about identifying Sir Thomas, or about finding out where he went to after landing from the Prince George. He sought the headquarters of the King's officers himself. Monument to the Late Queen for Parliament Grounds.

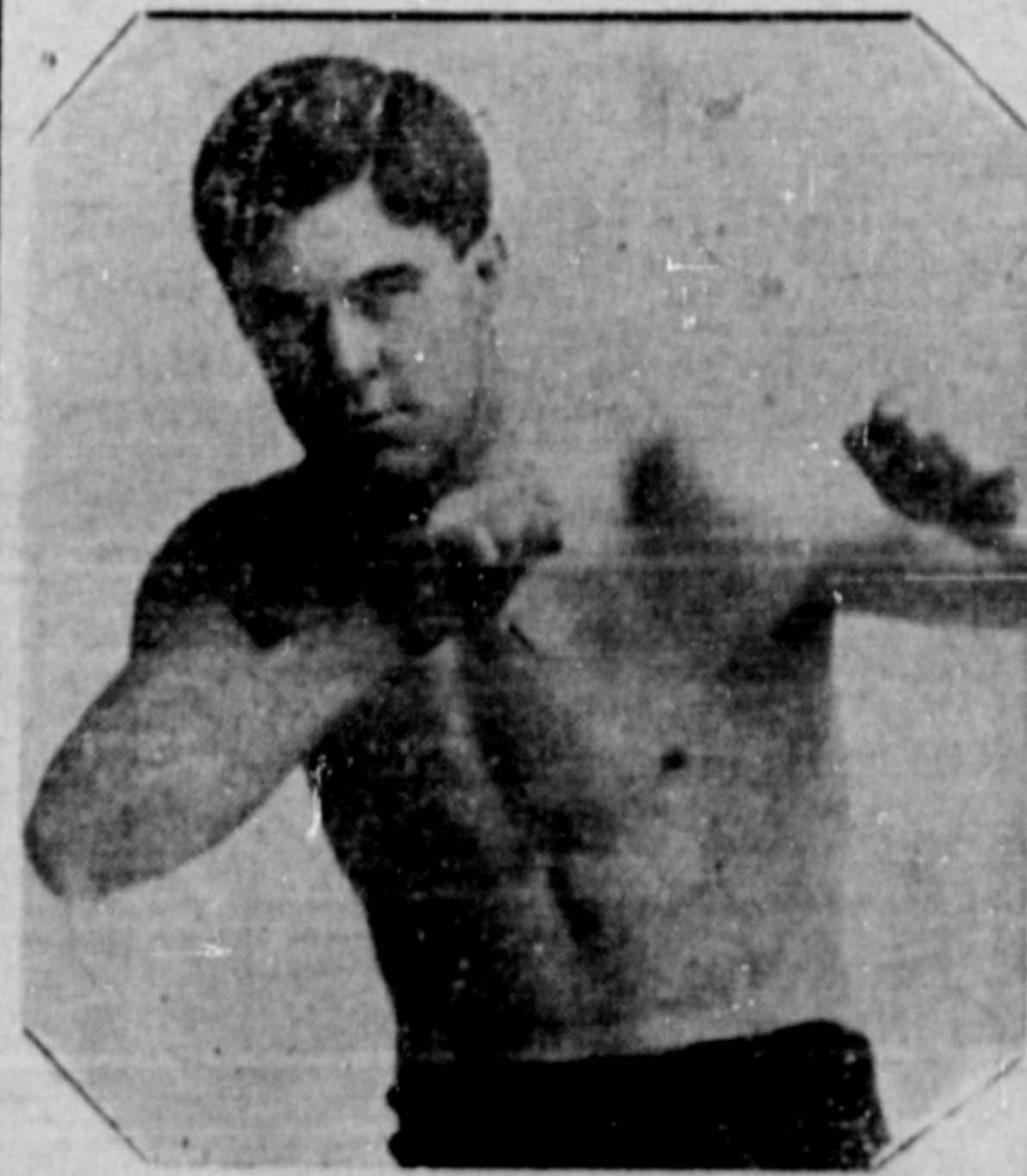
