HAZELTON MINING NOTES

Duke Harris returned from the Hudson Bay Mountain this week and brought in some samples of nickel ore which may also have associated with it cobalt and white iron. It is quite a new ore in this district.

The Glengarry group has been causing considerable interest the past week on account of a number of samples of ore brought in by W. J. McKenzie, one of the owners. The property is situated on the New Hazelton side of Rocher de Boule Mountain, and adjoins New Hazelton Heights, in fact, one of their stakes is located on Twenty-third avenue. Ritchie and Schwarzler have been doing considerable work on the property for a week or two and they are showing up the vein in pretty good shape. They have thus far discovered three veins on three different claims, and all of them are very promising. The ore is copper, gold and silver.

On Saturday afternoon the first shipment of coal to leave New Hazelton for the coast, or for any other point, was pulled out by the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, and was bound for the Nanaimo Gas and Coke Company's works. The coal came from the Grand Trunk B. C. Coal Company's property at Twenty Mile, about fifteen miles east of New Hazelton, and located alongside the railway.

BELLA COOLA NOTES.

Mr. Cran returns to his duties as manager of the Bank of B. N. A. after spending his vacation with friends in Lillooet, where he was formerly in charge of a branch of the same bank.

The catch of salmon at Bella Coola this season is much below the average, the total pack to date at the local cannery being only 5,000 cases.

About the same pack is reported from both the Kisquit and Manitou canneries on Dean Channel.

While this year's pack at Bella Coola cannery is considerably below the average, the packs at the Kisquit plants are somewhat higher than usual.

Mr. A. H. Tomlinson, assistant horticulturist, of Prince Rupert, has been spending the week in the valley.

District Forester H. S. Irwin of Prince Rupert arrived by motor launch on Monday last and spent several days in the valley in connection with his duties.

The local farmers are still busily engaged getting in their hay, of which very heavy crops are reported.—Bella Coola Courier.

P. J. Jennings arrived in New Hazelton Wednesday evening to spend a few days after several strenuous weeks on the Highland Boy on Rocher de Boule Mountain. He reports that the No. 2 tunnel, which is on the vein 150 feet below the first tunnel, is in 40 feet and there is a full face of ore. The showing is even stronger than the No. 4 tunnel, where they have four feet of chalcopryrite. Good progress is being made and the property is in fine shape for more men and they are being sent up next week to work on the No. 2 tunnel. Great depth will be had here, gaining nearly foot for foot of tunnel.

James Smith was in town the latter part of the week, after having completed the assessment work on a number of claims in the district. He is here on behalf of Dan Ferguson, Rossland, and has made a report to Mr. Ferguson on the different properties he was inspecting and working on. Jim says that the Silver Bow on Nine Mile Mountain is looking well. It requires the extension of the trail from Dutch Cline's property, the Silver Bell, to the Silver Bow before very much effective work can be accomplished. On the Wild Rose on Four Mile Mountain, and not far from the Erie mine, he did some work and got some good samples of the ore from the bottom of the forty foot shaft which he has sent down to Mr. Ferguson.—Omineca Herald.

WIRELESS SERVICE IS ESTABLISHED TO ASIA

U. S. Signal Service Men Nightly in Touch with Stations in Siberia

Nome, Alaska, July 28.—Direct wireless communication between America and Asia now is an accomplished fact, the United States army signal corps station here being nightly in communication since Sunday with the Russian station at Anadyr, Siberia, 500 miles west of Nome.

A message from Baron Kleit, governor of the Siberian province of Kamchatka, who visited Nome a short time ago, was transmitted extending congratulations on the establishment of wireless communication.

The Russian government operates a chain of four stations between Anadyr and Vladivostok and for the last six months the signal corps operators here have been trying under orders from Washington, to establish communication with the Russian station.

NEWS FROM SMITHERS

The saw mill of the Seymour Lake Lumber Company has started cutting logs after a delay of two weeks, occasioned by a defective engine part which had to be sent to Vancouver for repairs. The owners are well pleased with the way the new plant works and, although they are somewhat later in getting started than they anticipated, they expect to be able to fill the large number of orders for domestic lumber which they are expecting as soon as the lots are placed on the market.

An appropriation has been made for grading Main street from the station to City Hall square, and for laying six foot plank sidewalks on both sides of the street, work on which will be started immediately.

Mr. John Hutchison, accompanied by A. C. Aldous, of the firm of Aldous & Murray, Ltd., and P. B. Carr, visited Smithers last week for the purpose of inspecting the townsite in the interests of the government making their selection of lots.

Before leaving Mr. Aldous stated that he would be back within a week, when contracts would be let for some of the preliminary work in connection with their extensive plans for development, which will entail the expenditure of a quarter of a million dollars. The first work to be undertaken will be the opening up of the streets and the installation of a drainage system, after which street grading and the building of sidewalks will be undertaken. Mr. Aldous also stated that the electric light and water power plants were now assured, and the actual work upon the latter would commence within two weeks.

Bigelow & O'Neil's new seven passenger Packard car was the first machine to make the trip to Telkwa this year. It arrived last Monday, driven by "Wiggs" O'Neil, and had several passengers for this place. It is understood that regular trips will be made after the week, connecting with every train from Rupert.

H. E. Bigelow is having extensive plans prepared for a large, up-to-date building for the business that he will establish in Smithers.

T. L. Carr, of the Williams-Carr Lumber & Investment Company, came to Smithers last week for the purpose of establishing the company's permanent offices.—Telkwa Tribune.

The road from Telkwa is much improved. It is expected that the highway will be continued through the town. The improvement of the road to Chicken Lake and Moricetown has also been promised.

Among the Hazelton business men who will come to Smithers is Isadore Angers, the tailor, who has purchased two lots in the business section and will at once erect a large store.—Smithers Review.
