THE NEXT UNIONIST LEADER MAY BE AUSTEN CHAMBERLAIN

HE IS MENTIONED AS A LIKELY SUCCESSOR TO BONAR LAW— HE HAS THE ADVANTAGE OF POSSESSING MORE EXPERIENCE OF OFFICE.

London, Aug. 2.—In connection with the celebration of twenty-one years' uninterrupted representation of the constituency of East Worcestershire by the Rt. Hon. Austen Chamberlain there is a revival of the rumor that he will replace Bonar Law as leader of the Unionist party. During the sessions of 1912 Mr. Chamberlain considerably enhanced his reputation and he has loyally stood by Mr. Bonar Law despite certain disagreements as to policy. Lately he has effaced himself so as to give no handle to any such rumors as are now being revived and in order that Mr. Bonar Law should in no wise feel himself embarrassed. By this self-effacement, like Mr. Balfour, the former leader has escaped responsibility and criticism without damaging his reputation as a good politician.

It is said in political circles that one of the most difficult things for a politician to acquire is the knowledge of when to sit quietly in his tent and when to unsheathe his tongue and charge upon the foe with all the batallions of his eloquence. In this connection the ability of Mr. Austen Chamberlain to keep in the background at the right time and the impossibility for Mr. Lloyd-George to efface himself after the

Marconi affair is a matter of speculative interest. Lloyd-George has undoubtedly lost a great deal of reputation and ground by not resigning over the Marconi affair and allowing a year or two to elapse while he rests and resharpens his weapons with calm study leavened by experience. This is what Mr. Chamberlain has been able to do and his position has been greatly strengthened thereby.

His official experience has placed him consecutively as financial secretary to the treasury and as civil lord of the admiralty. He entered the Unionist cabinet in 1902 as postmaster general and in 1903 instead of following his father into retirement over the tariff reform controversy he became chancellor of the exchequer. In this position he stood, so to speak, on his own feet without the protecting wing of his father. He was only 39 and his first and subsequent budget speeches were considered admirable. He had a particularly difficult task, as the finances of the country had to be reorganized after the Boer war. On the other hand, Mr. Bonar Law, beyond being for four years parliamentary secretary to the Board of Trade, has had no experience of office.

PRINCE GETS WARM GREETING FROM PRETTY MAORI MAIDENS

PRINCE GEORGE OF BATTENBERG, WHO IS ABOARD THE NEW ZEALAND, HAD ONE RECEPTION THAT HE WILL LONG REMEMBER.

Vancouver, Aug. 6.—Before the battle cruiser New Zealand left here a story leaked out of the reception which was accorded to Prince George of Battenberg when the warship was welcomed by the Maoris at Russell, New Zealand. He was the centre of an unrehearsed incident in the reception. An old and much tattooed native seized the hand of Prince George of Battenberg and shook it effusively, while several Maori maidens slapped him on the back. A pretty native girl threw her arms around his neck and kissed him on both cheeks.

The prince blushed and was greatly embarrassed, beating a hasty retreat. Captain Halsey was a much amused spectator, until the Maori damsel made straight for him. The captain glanced right and left, but escape was impossible, and amid unrestrained merriment the brown arms embraced his neck and the maiden's triumph was complete. It was some moments before Captain Halsey recovered. Then the officers formed a line and shook hands with each of the native party.

Several maidens singled out Prince George and kissed him as they passed. This time he bore

the ordeal unflinchingly, but he looked relieved all the same when this unrehearsed part of the ceremony was over.

ROBBED AMBASSADOR

Henry Lane Wilson Was Victim of Pickpockets.

New York, Aug. 2.—Henry Lane Wilson, United States ambassador to Mexico, was the victim of pickpockets, who secured his wallet, containing \$128, valuable papers and official memoranda, while the ambassador was escorting two women friends to a Long Island train in the Pennsylvania station yesterday. It was learned today.

News of Mr. Wilson's loss became public when railroad detectives who had received the ambassador's complaint had consulted with detectives from police headquarters. All parties were reticent regarding the details, but it was said that the ambassador was not greatly concerned over the incident.

STOP TRAIN

Grasshoppers on Track Delay Train in Kansas.

Dodge City, Kas., Aug. 1.—"Train No. 564 delayed forty minutes; stalled by grasshoppers," was the report received at the Rock Island station here yesterday. The train was coming out of Dodge City when it struck a deep cut which always causes a snow blockade when there is a snowstorm. The wind had blown dead grasshoppers over the rails in such numbers that the engine wheels slipped and spun around, leaving the train motionless. The train crew scooped the hoppers off the track and sanded the rails before the train could proceed.

What Happens When the Skirt Splits.

New York, Aug. 1.—The story of a slit skirt that became more so as its wearer, Miss Gwendolyn Haynes of Minneapolis, attempted to board the steamer Carillo at Port Limon was related yesterday by passengers when the ship docked here. The skirt was a Parisian creation, made from measurements sent by mail. It fitted snugly. The gangplank was at an angle of 60 degrees. When Miss Haynes bent her knee to ascend there was a loud rip. She held the torn edges of the skirt together and sidled back to her carriage. She will come north by the next boat.

ROPE OF PEARLS STOLEN

Necklace Said to Be Worth Sixty Thousand Dollars.

New York, Aug. 2.—Gems valued at \$75,000, including a rope of pearls worth \$60,000, were stolen from the home of C. C. Rumsey, at Narragansett Pier, within 24 hours ending Sunday night. Mrs. Rumsey was a daughter of the late E. H. Harriman. The theft was made known today. The rope of pearls was given to Mrs. Rumsey by her mother and had a sentimental value far in excess of its intrinsic worth.

London, Aug. 1.—Prince Henry, the third son of King George, who is at a preparatory school at Broadstairs, is allowed \$250 a week pocket money. The Queen wrote Headmaster Saunders to obtain all the letters from Behrens and refund the \$50.
