

PRINCE FORGOT SOMETHING AND MARRIED AN AMERICAN HEIRESS

WNA LAUNDRY LADY WISHES TO REMIND HIM AND BRINGS A CLAIM AGAINST HIM OF FIFTY THOUSAND DOLLARS.

Los Angeles, Aug. 5.—Mrs. Melcher, the proprietress of a laundry in Vienna, appeared before Charles T. Connell, United States immigration inspector, and was interrogated relative to her coming to this country and to the claims she has against Prince Stanislaus Saulkowski, a nephew of the Grand Duke of Berlitz, and son of a noble Austrian house. The prince was married last Monday night to Miss Marie Louise Freese, daughter of a retired millionaire, with a quiet home ceremony, plans for a brilliant wedding having been suddenly changed. An attorney, who was first approached by Mrs. Melcher and retained by the prince, said he had suggested to Mr. Freese, the prince's father-in-law, a payment of \$5,000 or \$10,000 in settlement of the woman's claims, but Mrs. Melcher, through her lawyer, declared she must have not less than \$50,000. In the meantime the prince and his bride are on their wedding trip, but where no one outside the Freese family knows. Mr. Freese contented himself with declaring that the prince and princess were out of the country. Connell declined to comment today on the case, saying merely that it had been brought to him for investigation under a federal law. Mr. Freese asserted that the demands of the woman had not caused the change in the announced wedding plans of the prince and his daughter, which resulted in the abandonment of the church ceremony and the substitution of the home affair last Monday night.

BIG IMMIGRATION

Million Newcomers This Season.

Montreal, Aug. 5.—The present season will probably show half a million immigrants, according to John Hoolahan of the Dominion immigration department. "The stream has been a steady one this year," said Mr. Hoolahan, "and we are well satisfied about the class we are getting. The number of deportations are kept at a low figure, because the examination now instituted on the other side, in addition to this side, is a rigid one."

Mr. Hoolahan ridiculed the idea that there is any scarcity of demand for labor. He declared that able bodied people who arrive and work without difficulty, with the possible exception of those who are either incapable or over-do-wells.

According to the reported stories given out by Jack Johnson, the negro pugilist, to people in France, Mr. Hoolahan said Canada would not receive the black pugilist if he attempted to come here again.

LEAPED TO DEATH

Girl Eludes Police and Commits Suicide.

Chicago, Aug. 5.—Eluding a patrol of police which were guarding the Jackson Park lagoon to prevent her from committing suicide, Miss Maud Pettes, 24 years old, a stenographer, leaped from a bridge into the lagoon late yesterday afternoon and was drowned.

Miss Pettes left her office at noon and mailed to special delivery letters to her mother and a girl friend, telling them that she was going to drown herself in the park.

Mrs. Pettes, the mother, advised the police at once on receipt of the letter and a detail of twenty policemen was sent to patrol the lagoon.

Miss Pettes slipped through the guard; it is thought shortly before dusk. The guard on the stone bridge heard a splash under the arch. No one was in sight when they ran up, but Miss Pettes' gloves and purse were found on the bridge rail. Her body was recovered a short time later.

OFFER PRINCELY REWARD

\$300,000 for Return of Pearls Worth \$750,000.

Paris, Aug. 5.—Three hundred thousand dollars has been placed in the hands of a Paris advocate for the recovery of the missing \$750,000 pearl necklace which was stolen between Paris and London. The amount was put up by a member of Lloyd's. In the meantime a dispute over the necklace is going on between Scotland Yard and the French detectives. The former claim that the pearls were lost in French territory, while the Paris detectives say the theft took place in England.

MARRIED IN HOSPITAL

Girl Braves Smallpox to Become a Bride.

Lebanon, Pa., Aug. 5.—Braving smallpox, Miss Miriam Bowman entered the hospital here today and was married to Wallace Van Sickles of Macon, Ga., a few hours before he died, a victim of typhoid fever.

Mr. Van Sickles recently won the promise of Miss Bowman to become his bride and the date of the wedding was fixed. Then Mr. Van Sickles was stricken with typhoid and there was a postponement. There was no change in his condition, however, so it was decided that the marriage ceremony should be performed in the hospital. The latter, owing to smallpox in it, was under quarantine, but the authorities permitted the young woman and a clergyman to enter the place after they had submitted to vaccination. The ceremony was performed and the bride remained at the bedside of her husband until he died.
