FOUND AMUSEMENT BY HAVING AN EGG FIGHT

Two Boys Who Broke Into Freight Cars Get Severe Reprimand.

Ed. and Fred Head, two boys about 8 or 9 years of age, received a severe reprimand from the police magistrate this morning for their misconduct. They were found by the police to have broken into a G. T. P. freight car and smashed a number of eggs. They are not thought to have taken the eggs home to eat, but were simply throwing them at each other and smashing them in a spirit of mischief. As they were so young the police magistrate let them off this time with a warning but said that if a member of the police force would call regular on their parents for some time to come to see that the lads were being kept at home.

The police are on the lookout for other youngsters who are damaging property in this fashion.

FOUGHT WAR AGAIN ON LINER PANONIA

Greeks, Servians, Bulgarians and Turks Fight in Steerage on Atlantic.

New York, Aug. 14.—Officers of the Cunard liner Panonia, which arrived here from Trieste, report that a miniature Balkan war occurred almost continuously during the twenty-six days' voyage. Among the steerage passengers were several hundred ex-volunteers, Greeks, Servians, Bulgarians and Turks, who were returning to this country after taking part in the Balkan war. Frequent riots between these hostile factions in the first few days resulted in several combatants going to the sick bay with severe stab wounds.

Captain Capper thereupon ordered a general disarming, but the fighting continued with what ever missiles were at hand. The nationalities were separated into groups, but on meeting for meals the battle was resumed.

As a precautionary measure the stewards removed the knives and forks from the tables, all the steerage passengers, of whom there were 1,124, being obliged to eat with spoons.

It is stated that the women in the warring camps fought as fiercely as the men.

THE NEW ORGAN

"Daily Telegraph" Started Off Very Well.

The first issue of the new Liberal paper in Montreal, the Daily Telegraph, was a great success. The presses were completely overtaken, and the management was obliged to ask contemporaries to aid in printing the editions. It was the greatest initial success in Canadian journalism.—Canadian Mail.

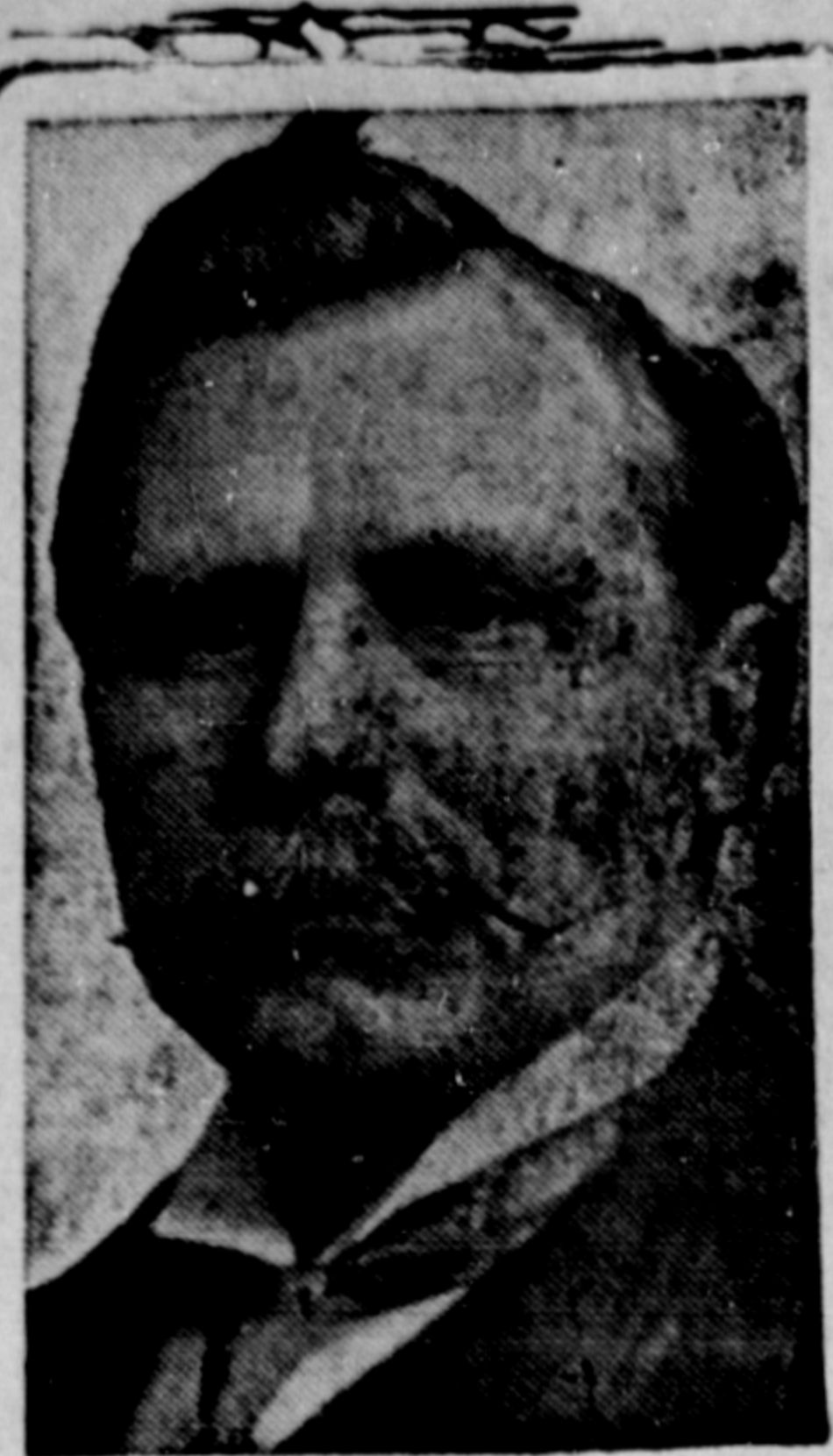
FIVE THOUSAND MILE ROAD

unpaid taxes, which would affect this, was not existing when the present council was elected.

"These items are certainly entered for effect," said Mayor Pattullo. "They are there for the effect of showing that these sums have to be paid."

The statement showed a total overdraft of \$30,000 at the end of 1912. There were also outstanding accounts which had to be paid amounting to \$14,000. In addition, about \$11,000 had to be returned to the telephone account. This made the \$55,000 of debt mentioned as left over by last year's administration.

The estimates were finally all passed and also the bylaw which fixes the rate for the year at 16.90, or, with the rebates, 14.40 mills.

YET MORE SUSPICIONS CONCERNING JAP SHIP

What Cargo Did She Bring From Japan to This Coast?

It is reported that the crew of the Japanese steamer Kinkaza Maru were engaged all night in loading ballast for the trip to New Westminster. The officers of the vessel count on weighing anchor this afternoon.

This work, done by the crew last night, has caused more rumors to circulate concerning the purpose of the vessel in coming to these coasts. The question is being asked, if she is now shipping ballast for Vancouver what did she have aboard on her trip from Japan?

Among the officers of the vessel are former naval men who served in the Russo-Japanese war. The captain, whose name is Koga, has been before this in vessels coming to the British Columbia coast.

As the boat stopped overnight very close to Cape Chacum, off the south end of Prince of Wales Island, various suspicions are afloat as to her purpose in going there. Many people connect her trip with the smuggling of Orientals into this province or Alaska.

RACED TRAIN

Aviator in Monoplane Was Victor in Contest.

Washington, D. C., Aug. 14.—C. Marvin Wood, the American aviator, attempted a non-stop race in his monoplane with a train from New York to Washington and thence to Fort Myer, Va., for exhibition flights. He reached his destination late in the afternoon after he had been compelled to interrupt his flight on a farm near Gaithersburg, Md., sixteen miles from Washington. Wood won his race with the train, making the landing at Gaithersburg at one minute after 9 o'clock, forty minutes before the train rolled into the station. He failed to break all the American records he had hoped to smash, but claimed to have established new marks for non-stop flying between two points and for duration.

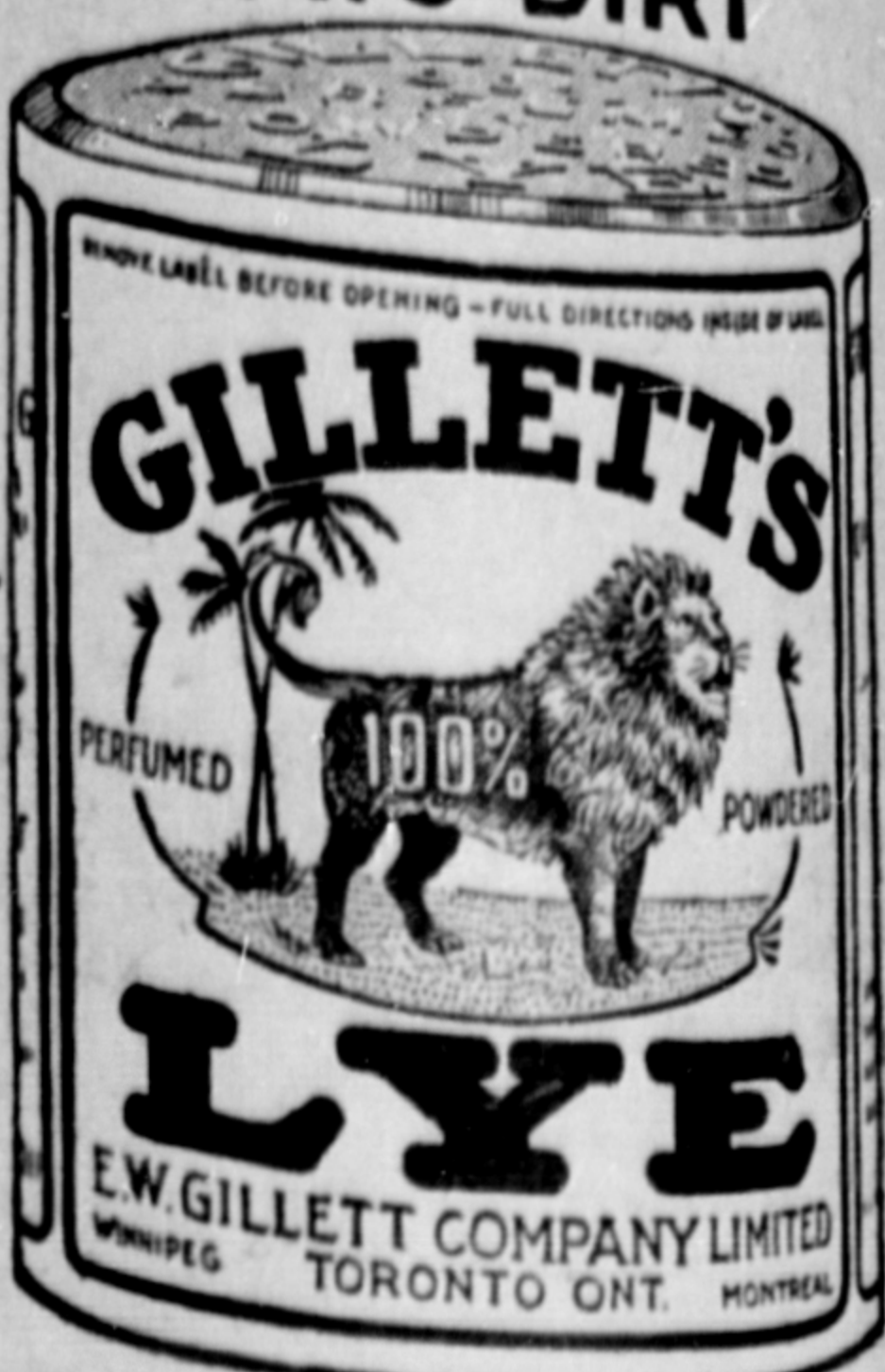
