## GOVERNMENT GEOLOGIST FOR INSPECTION OF OIL WELLS

GRAHAM ISLANDERS DESIRE ASSISTANCE OF GOVERNMENT IN OPENING UP GREAT STORES OF FUEL WEALTH FOR DEVELOPMENT.

We have read the opinions of noted men, says the Queen Charlotte Islander, who state that there is oil in different parts of this island, and have seen the shale, tar and other indications of the existence of oil. The wonder is that so little interest is taken by those who have capital and who will invest thousands of dollars in developing mining property while there is the prospect of obtaining so great a return on capital invested in oil fields. The government, also, obtains a large revenue from licenses for the exploitation of coal and oil.

There are thousands of claim holders paying for licenses on these islands. They all have faith in the proposition, but the majority are poor men. The company now working has expended over twenty thousand dollars. Would it not be in the interest of the whole country to pay a bonus to men who will place oil drills and spend a certain sum in development work? It is to help in the advancement of a country that we are taxed. There is no industry to compare with furnishing fuel, in the shape of oil, to the many who now are compelled to use it for commercial and domestic purposes.

We feel certain if one of the geologists now employed by the government would visit the west coast and examine the fields he would report favorably on it. There are today men who have been employed in some of the greatest oil fields in the world who have visited the place where a drill is now placed, and their expert opinion is that there is no doubt of the existence of oil in large quantities. They are not in a position to invest in the necessary machinery, but are willing to prove their assertions by giving their time to the work of

drilling if assured of enough capital to pay for the plant.

We have met several of these men, and they are enthusiastic over the matter, so much so that they have invested in claims, which they are willing to donate to any company ready to invest capital on terms that should ensure a great profit. We are permitting the introduction of fuel oil free of duty for the reason that our railroad and steamship companies must have it, thereby losing a large sum to the revenue of the whole Dominion and preventing the coal companies from employing men.

With oil fields in our own territory that it only needs opening up, there is wealth and these islands would be benefited immeasurably. It is the duty of every resident to make an attempt to have the government experts visit the localities where oil is known to exist and have some effort made to bring it to the surface. It will be the greatest advertisement for the island that could be given.

Many of our residents are interested in oil claims. They should move and move rapidly to have a geologist sent to the oil fields and give out to the investing portion of the population an opportunity to know, officially, that we have what is now needed to supply the great demand for fuel.
