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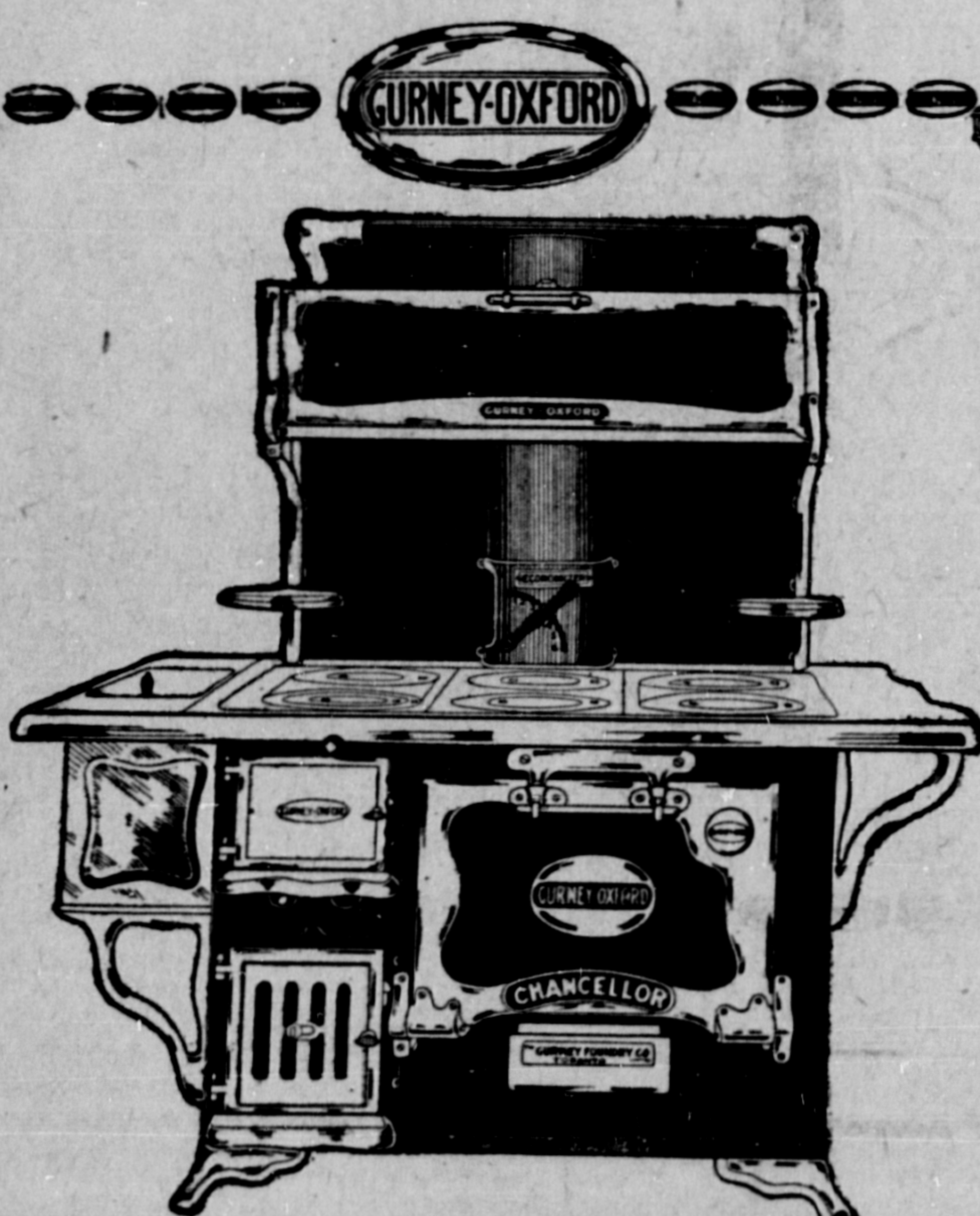

AUTOMATON SOLDIER DREAD WAR ENGINE

Skirmishers Firing 400 Shots—Each Effective at Three Thousand Yards.

Yet another terrible engine of war is likely to be added to the equipment of modern armies, if the invention of an engineer named Aassen of Copenhagen fulfills expectations. This engineer has perfected an invention which he calls a "soldier-automaton," an automatic machine for replacing the line of skirmishers for defence purposes.

Briefly, it consists of a cylinder which is buried in the ground and which, like submarine mines, may stay there for years without being damaged. A signal station at a distance of four or five miles away is connected with the cylinder. By pressing a button an electric current is transmitted and the cylinder shoots up until it is about two feet from the level of the ground, firing at the same moment four hundred shots in a horizontal direction.

The value of such an invention in repelling invaders is obvious. It means that one of these cylinders can take the place, at any point, of four hundred soldiers, and if a number are buried in proper systematic order over a certain stretch of country a continuous hail of bullets can be fired at an invading army without the latter seeing a single enemy.

A number of these cylinders, in fact, makes a line of skirmishers whose operations may inflict terrible damage on the enemy. The shots take effect at a distance of three thousand yards, and the inventor calculates that only 10 per cent. of the enemy would be saved after an attack of these automatic troops.

The "skirmishers" would be placed in rows behind each other, to be used successively for resisting various attacks, and as the cylinders are hidden in the ground no enemy can know where the line is before the firing starts.

DOUBTFUL BAY RUM BEING DISPENSED

Chief Analyst McGill Issues a Bulletin Regarding Both Bay Rum and Florida Water.

Ottawa, Sept. 4.—Bay rum, as it is being dispensed in certain parts of Canada today constitutes an evasion of the law. This statement is made by Chief Analyst McGill of the department of inland revenue in a bulletin issued today by the department dealing with bay rum and Florida water. Several samples secured at various points in the Dominion labelled as superior bay rum were analyzed and found to contain less than 33 1-3 per cent. of alcohol. Several samples were found to be made up largely of alcohol and wood alcohol. Samples of Florida water analyzed were a mixture of methyl alcohol. While not condemned, a great many of these samples were characterized as "doubtful."

New Westminster, Sept. 6.—For the first time since the Big Four Lacrosse League was formulated a team from that Association will play New Westminster for the Minto Cup. Kennedy, owner of the Irish-Canadians, asking what terms the local club will offer for a series to be played during Fair Week here, Sept. 30 and Oct. 4 being the dates suggested. Last year the exhibition people guaranteed Cornwall - Westminster clubs \$7,000 for the two games and a similar offer will be made this year, it is said.

IS GOOD POLITICIAN BUT A POOR SOLDIER

Second Cousin to King George Criticizes Viscount Haldane, the Lord Chancellor.

New York, Sept. 4.—Among those who arrived from Liverpool yesterday was Colonel Sir Augustus Charles Fitzgeorge, youngest son of the late Duke of Cambridge and second cousin to King George. He is on his way to Canada to inspect some mining properties in which he is interested. Colonel Fitzgeorge consented to go to a sunny spot on the pier to have his picture taken. He said that he had been a soldier all his life and was an officer at the garrison at Quebec in 1897. When asked what he thought of Lord Haldane, Colonel Fitzgeorge said: "He is a very good fellow and a first rate politician, but a very poor soldier. When he was secretary of war in England, Lord Haldane antagonized the military men in England by trying to abolish the militia and replace them by territorials."
