### THE VOICE OF ULSTER GROWS MORE MENACING

army suggests the attitude of many regular officers toward the Ulster question. The force is absolutely democratic and the leaders of the companies and sections were elected by popular vote of the ranks.

Belfast gunsmiths are doing a great trade. The business of the city goes on in the usual methodical manner, but those who go there to market often come away with strange goods.

It may be confidently asserted that King George will not accept the advice which prominent Unionists, such as George Cave, K. C., M. P., and a section of the Ulster press, are publicly urging upon him—namely, to refuse the royal assent to the home rule bill. It is Mr. Redmond's confident prophecy that an Irish parliament will be set up in Dublin next year, which so stirs the indignation and alarms of the Unionists and especially of Ulster. They declare, in the words of Arnold White, the well known publicist, that the King only can now save the United Kingdom from dismemberment and Ulster from anarchy and civil war. A petition to the King is now being organized.

Mr. A. J. Balfour declared in a speech at Haddington on Saturday:

"We are on the verge of great events. I am not sure that everybody realizes how near we are to difficulties that may prove insoluble or almost insoluble to British statesmanship. If I am right we shall soon be in the thick of the conflict. Let us, then, make a preparation for the great event."

Mr. Balfour's fear is that Mr. Asquith means to defer dissolution till after home rule becomes law, a course which he calls wildly imprudent and grossly immoral. He declares the government's duty is to hold a general election before the King assents to the bill.
