SEAL COVE RESIDENTS PLAN READING ROOM

St. Peter's Church Will Be Opened Week Nights as Reading Room and Night School.

"Standing room only" was the sign that might have been hung out Thursday night at St. Peter's Church, Seal Cove. A most enjoyable concert was given by the musical talent of Seal Cove, assisted by several artists from the city. The program consisted of songs by Mrs. McLeod, Mrs. Tattersall, Miss Freeman, Mr. Mellor, Mr. Davis, Mr. Waddell, a duet by Rev. Mr. Rushbrook and Mr. Russell, mandolin solos by Mrs. Freeman and a much appreciated Italian quartette. Mrs. Tattersall played the accompaniments, while Rev. Mr. Rix presided in the absence of Captain McCoskie. At the close of the program the ladies of the church served refreshments.

It was the initiatory meeting of the new Seal Cove reading room and night school. It was explained to the audience that on account of the distance from town and the difficulty of getting in cold and stormy weather, St. Peter's Church would be opened every week night, except Saturday, from 7 till 10 o'clock as a reading room. Here could be found the latest magazines and papers, games could be indulged in and occasional lectures given. THAW MUST JOIN WORK GANG WHEN HE RE-ENTERS ASYLUM

Paris salon prize two years ago. Many sketches by Thaw himself are here.

Thaw arose generally at six o'clock, took a cold shower or plunge, had breakfast in the main dining room and did some clerical work in the storeroom until 10 or 11 o'clock.

He played handball in the recreation yard from which he escaped. He was of a morose, reticent nature, generally mingling but little with the other inmates. He had numberless opportunities for just such a flight as he took.

His afternoons were spent reading or writing.

Thaw was always in the main dining room at meal time. He was always well supplied with fruits, cakes, jams and other dainties shipped twice a week by a Fish-kill grocer—a standing order from Thaw's mother.

Unlike many other inmates, Thaw was permitted to read after "taps," but most of the time preferred to go to bed early. He was a heavy sleeper, and awoke generally in a depressed mood.

Before he became superintendent, Dr. Kieb had personal charge of Thaw. Since he has been in charge of the institution he has striven to treat Thaw on scientific lines, suggested by close observation of his case.

When Thaw returns he will be denied free access to the recreation yard. He will become a member of the work gang, busy six or eight hours a day. He will have a guard in constant attendance, and his hours of recreation will be spent at the side of a keeper.
