EXCURSION TRAINS FOR THE FAIR ARRANGED

Steamer Prince George to Leave Here Early Wednesday to Bring Stewart Visitors.

As a result of a lengthy conference held yesterday afternoon between General Agent Albert Davidson and a committee of the Prince Rupert exhibition, the whole question of transportation and schedules for visitors to the fair from interior points, Queen Charlotte Islands and Stewart was definitely arranged.

A special excursion train will leave Morietown at 8 a. m. Tuesday, 23rd inst., making all local stops and reaching Prince Rupert early the same evening. This will provide more adequate facilities for those coming from interior points along the main line of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway and permit visitors being in town for the opening ceremonies Wednesday morning. The usual freight train will be run Monday morning, arriving here early Tuesday afternoon, on which exhibits can be sent. Each agent along the line has been fully instructed regarding the matter.

To accommodate Stewart visitors the Prince George, arriving here from the south on the morning of Wednesday, the 24th, will proceed immediately after unloading her perishables for Stewart, about noon, arriving in the mining town at 10 p. m., and return the same evening, reaching here early Thursday morning.

Provision has also been made that the Prince Albert, due here Tuesday, the 23rd, from Vancouver, via Queen Charlotte Island ports, will proceed from Skidegate direct to Masset and thence to Prince Rupert, arriving some time in the early morning of the opening day of the exhibition. Returning the Prince Albert is scheduled to leave here Friday evening at 8 o'clock instead of Saturday, calling first at Masset and then proceeding south to Vancouver. This will permit island visitors staying here the whole length of the fair.

Over six hundred large posters have been distributed at points along the main line of the G. T. P., including every station and provincial road camp, besides Indian agents, Indian villages, farmers' institutes, all postmasters throughout the interior, members of the advisory board and members of the association.

In several cases fireworks posters have been included. Besides this publicity every newspaper has been publishing stories of the fair, together with advertisements.

Though the date for entries was supposed to close yesterday, it is announced by Secretary L. Bullock-Webster that no one will be debarred by being late, though he requests that entries be sent in as speedily as possible.

G. T. P. ANNEX TO BE VACATED AT ONCE

The occupants of the G. T. P. Annex have received notice that they must vacate not later than Thursday morning. The work of tearing down the building will start within a few days.

SENTENCES DEFERRED IN FORGERY CASES

Hearing Completed This Morning and Judgment to Be Handed Down Tomorrow.

After hearing a vast amount of evidence, a large part of which required the services of an interpreter, Judge Young yesterday afternoon rendered his decision in the case of Rex vs. Zalloff, finding the accused guilty on a charge of forging cheques, but deferred sentence until today. According to evidence previously published, Zalloff forged a cheque in favor of one Militch which he cashed at the Empress Hotel and attempted to cash several other cheques at the same place.

The trial of Chudhoff, charged with stealing these cheques, occupied the attention of the court from 11 o'clock this morning. The morning session lasted until after 4 o'clock in order to complete the case. Judge Young reserved his decision until tomorrow morning at 11 o'clock, when he will also give the sentence in the case of Zalloff, found guilty of forgery.
