

BRITISH PREMIER DOES NOT LIKE LETTER OF LOREBURN

SAYS CONSENT TO PROPOSALS OF A CONFERENCE WOULD
BREAK UP PARTY AND ALIENATE IRISHMEN—CAR-
SON'S NEVER SURRENDER ORY

London, Sept. 20.—Premier Asquith is freely stated in government circles to be more than annoyed at the intervention of Lord Loreburn in the Irish Government controversy without any previous hint to himself.

While he continues desirous of receiving any suggestion of practical policy which would tend to reassure and safeguard Ulster Protestantism, he holds that as the cabinet has placed their plan fully before parliament and the country, any alternative for an amended plan should be made equally clear.

He will not consent to the idea of a conference unless some preliminary basis for a settlement which are more definite than any Unionist in a responsible position has yet put forward. If he did indeed so consent the fight-

ing element in his party would drop away from him while he would alienate the Nationalists for all time.

It is significant that John Redmond remains silent. If there had been the least sign of yielding on the part of the cabinet he would have been found ready to speak and very plainly.

F. E. Smith, K.C., addressing the Unionist demonstration at Kilkennydown County, this afternoon, said that Lord Loreburn had taken a long time to discover what Ulster had been saying for the last three years. Unionists would have no compromise on the Home Rule Question.

Sir Edward Carson, who also spoke, said the Unionists of Ireland were not going into a conference which meant absolute surrender. They knew no surrender.

PROVING BIG COAL SEAMS ON MORICE

FAVORABLE REPORTS FROM TAHTSA STRIKE

Original Discoverers on Sibola
Creek Now Engaged in Sink-
ing to Bedrock.

Favorable reports continue to come from the new Tahtsa placer field. A number of valley men who took part in the stampede have returned in the last few days, and all declare that the district promises well. Many had gold to show as the result of surface panning. Three hundred men are reported to be in the district, which appears to be of considerable extent. Late arrivals state that a large number of claims have been staked, mainly on three creeks.

On Sibola Creek, where the first discovery was made, the original locators are now engaged in sinking to bedrock, and are making good progress, with full confidence in the existence of a good paystreak. A majority of those who have come out will lose no time in getting back with tools and supplies for working their claims and it is probable that before the snow flies the miners will have a definite knowledge of the actual value of the gold field.—Omineca Miner.
