RUPERT'S FIRST FAIR IS NOW IN FULL SWING

(Continued from page 1)

Hon. C. Price Ellison.

Hon. C. Price Ellison was given a most enthusiastic reception by the large gathering. In opening his address he drew attention to the many difficulties he had experienced in reaching Prince Rupert in time for the opening. For the purpose of gathering information concerning the interior he had come by way of Edmonton and Tete Jaune Cache. As the difficulties of travel increased he feared many times he would be unable to get here in time. Coming down the Fraser the boatmen objected to running at night, telling him of the chances they took of landing in Kingdom Come. "Turn her loose," I said. "Prince Rupert or Kingdom Come is good enough for me." He had cancelled nine engagements for opening other exhibitions in order that he might reach here in time. He was somewhat afraid that it would be impossible to congratulate Prince Rupert on its first exhibition, but from what he had already seen of it he was astonished and the citizens of the district had every reason to be proud. From his trip through the interior he had found the country immensely rich in resources of all kinds and it is up to the people to take a part in their development. To do so they must have faith and there is no reason why this should be lacking. The example set by the government in spending \$500,000 for government buildings in Prince Rupert and that set by the G. T. P. in building a hotel that promises to eclipse the Empress in Victoria should give ample courage to others. He referred to the excellent roadbed of the G. T. P., particularly the last 100 miles over which he travelled and to the scenic beauty of the route. This in itself is a great resource for Prince Rupert and will bring thousands of tourists here annually.

Referring particularly to agriculture, Hon. Mr. Ellison said that the products in the interior had astounded him. Coming through he had seen a fourth crop of alfalfa grown on one ranch this season. In the Okanagan, considered the most famous agricultural section of the province, he had been able to raise only three crops. Holding up to view a potato which he had a few moments before picked from a stand in the vegetable tent, he said that nothing better could be grown anywhere. The province of B. C. imported annually between \$15,000,000 and \$20,000,000 worth of agricultural products. He had no doubt whatever but that before long the province could and would produce enough for its own consumption.

Addressing the school children, the speaker endorsed the remarks of Mayor Pattullo and said that the residents of the province had every reason to be proud of the splendid educational facilities that were offered. There was no reason, he said, why among the large gathering of children before him there was not even a future premier of Canada.

In formally opening the fair, the honorable gentleman said that it was but the beginning of what should become one of the best fairs in the province. The coun-

try through which he had travelled was undoubtedly one of the best parts of the province from an agricultural standpoint. He regretted that he could not remain in the city longer on this occasion but hoped to return at an early date and make a longer visit.

Medal Presented.

At the conclusion of the address, Mr. McMullin, the president, presented to Hon. Mr. Ellison a neatly engraved medal as a memento of the occasion. It was customary, he said, on such an occasion to present a key, but as there was no key for the present building a medal was substituted.

With the singing by the school children of "God Save the King" the opening ceremonies were brought to a close and the doors were thrown open to the public.

Indian Band Contest.

The first of the contests among the Indian bands was finished this morning. It was the station-had already seen of it he was as a silver medal for each member. The prize went to Kitkatla. The other bands participating were Metlakatla, Kincolith, Greenville and Aiyansh. Prof. Milton Douglas of Seattle is the judge. Other contests are being held this afternoon.

Best Decorated Tables.

One of the prettiest features of this morning's program at the exhibition was the table decorating contest held in the balcony of the Industrial Hall. There were five entries and Mr. A. H. Tomlinson, the judge, had a hard task before coming to his final decision in awarding the first prize to Mrs. Percy F. Godenrath of Stewart. Mrs. A. Ackenberg won second place and Miss Du Vernet third. Each of the five tables were very tastefully decorated in flowers and ferns, but only two attempted to set their tables for service. Mrs. Godenrath had the full complement of silverware and cut glass for a party of four people, finishing her table with red ribbons, red carnations and red candle shades. Mrs. Ackenberg's table was set for two people, featuring yellow chrysanthemums and yellow candle shades. Miss Du Vernet and the two other entries arranged their tables only with flowers, but in all three cases the floral decorations showed excellent taste.

Band Contest Tomorrow.

Tomorrow at 11 a. m. sharp the five Indian bands will compete for the J. S. Gray silver cup for the best selection, members of the winning band also each receiving a silver medal. On Friday morning the bands will join the trades and labor parade and will play as they march. The winning band will receive the Wark cup and also a handsome kettle drum, given as a special prize by Whaley, Royce & Co. of Toronto.

Water Sports.

The competition for the best decorated boat this morning was so keen that the judges were unable to decide which of the contestants was winner. The prize was therefore divided between the Poin Sette decorated by Mrs. A. G. McLaren and the White Swan by Lionel Crippen.

Owing to the length of time taken by the launch races all the other water sports are postponed until Friday morning.

Directors' Luncheon.

At 12:15 today a complimentary

luncheon was tendered by the directors to Hon. C. Price Ellison, at the conclusion of which he was presented with a small package of Crippen's boneless herring. Responding, the minister said he fully realized that it was fish that had brought Northern British Columbia into prominent and therefore he would greatly prize the token given him.
