KILLED BY FALL OF HEAVY TANK

KING SETTLES STRIKE

Gamekeepers Win Demands for Old Customs.

London, Sept. 27.—King George has settled an incipient strike among the gamekeepers at his Sandringham estate. It is an old custom to give them the entire first day's bag, which realizes about \$300. This year the officials arranged to sell the whole shoot to London dealers. Underkeepers, comprising twenty-seven specially picked men, thereupon threatened to resign in a body, although the shooting still is four weeks off. The King, hearing of their grievance, promptly yielded to their demands.

ANOTHER MINING PROSPECT

Well Known Mining Man Locates Valuable Property at Doreen.

Harvey Howson, a well known mining man in Northern B. C., arrived in the city last night from Doreen, 126 miles up the Skeena, where he has been engaged for some time investigating a silver and lead prospect. Mr. Howson went in to Hazelton over ten years ago and was among the first to locate the coal properties near Telkwa that are now being carefully examined. He will return to Doreen in a short time to further look after his interests there. He left this morning for Victoria, taking away with him some fine samples of ore.

GUESSING CONTEST

Winner Midway Between Four Million and Two Hundred.

In the guessing contest conducted during the show in the booth put in by G. W. Nickerson, representing Quaker flour and other products, Mrs. Ford, of Fourth avenue, won the prize, a sack of Quaker flour. The jar of puffed wheat and puffed rice, on which the guessing was done, was found to contain 8,946 kernels. The guess of Mrs. Ford was 8,965. The next nearest guess was that of J. McIntosh, of the fire hall. He put it at 8,970. The highest guess was 400,000,000. The lowest was 200.

Immigrant Rush Continues.

Winnipeg, Sept. 24.—A total of 1,039 immigrants from Europe arrived in Winnipeg during the week ending September 23, according to figures issued by Commissioner J. Bruce Walker this morning. These include 605 British, 243 Russians, 116 Galicians and 75 Norwegians. Most of these are bound for points west of Manitoba.

Marmaduke Matthews Dies.

Toronto, Sept. 24.—Mr. Marmaduke Matthews, R. A. C., one of the best known Canadian artists, died today at the age of 74. He was one of the founders of both the Ontario Society of Artists and the Royal Canadian Academy.
