

CORRUPTION IN CHATEAUGUAY.

Liberals need feel no despondency over the result of Chateauguay. Hon. Sydney Fisher made an excellent running when it is considered that the number of French speaking voters in the riding is double that of the English speaking voters. The French were naturally interested in the warcry of the Nationalists, that none of Quebec's sons would ever be sent to fight for the Empire as long as Borden stood at its head. It is therefore not a victory for the Conservative government but for the Nationalists. It adds one to the Nationalist strength in parliament; one more shackle to the feet of Mr. Borden if he should ever desire to represent Canada as a whole; if he should ever have the ambition to prove himself a statesman. The Nationalist party is bound to become an Old Man of the Sea on his shoulders, influencing his conduct and misshapening his policy.


