Site for New Central School Has Been Cleared.

## QUEENSTOWN WHARF IS UNDER CONSTRUCTION

Will Be Thoroughly Substantial and Six Hundred and Fifty Feet Long.

The construction of the wharf at Queenstown is now being proceeded with and Contractor Gillett and his crew of workmen are busily engaged day and night rushing the work to completion. The wharf will be 650 feet long.

The work has been somewhat hindered by the exceptionally hard driving ground encountered trouble and delay. Mr. Gillett, in at the approach, causing much all his experience at a contractor in building wharfs, says he has never run up against such a hard proposition, the ground being like concrete. However, as the work progresses the driving will be much easier and quicker headway made.

The wharf when completed will be one of the most substantial in northern waters.
