

## ANXIETY OF ENGLAND OVER SITUATION IN MEXICO

### FURTHER DETAILS OF LLOYD GEORGE LAND SCHEME—TWO HUNDRED MINERS ARE ENTOMBED

#### LLOYD-GEORGE'S LAND SCHEME IS CREATING MUCH SURPRISE

**HAS SECURED CABINET'S APPROVAL TO PURSUE HIS PLANS  
IN HIS OWN WAY—UNIONISTS MAKING PREPARA-  
TIONS FOR EARLY ELECTION.**

London, Oct. 23.—Lloyd-George has created the greatest surprise by giving further details of the government land scheme. The lines of his speech yesterday indicate that he prevailed with the cabinet and overcame the opposition of the moderate section, securing the right to pursue his own plans in his own way. It is said the completed plans were ratified last Thursday, and that these do not presage a general election earlier than 1915, when, normally, the government would appeal to the people on home rule, Welsh disestablishment and electoral reform. These achieved the Liberals do not believe that

home rule will be sacrificed on the altar of land reform. But the Unionist organizers are considering the possibility of an early election and are promptly making preparations for it. They are making the most sweeping proposals, consisting of the appointment of a land ministry to take over the duties of the existing agricultural boards, land valuation, the work of the local government boards, housing arrangements and generally to handle all land questions are forecasted, as well as a guaranteed minimum wage and afforestation. The whole scheme is an effort at securing the full state control of an existing monopoly.

#### CHICAGO MILLIONAIRE AND PARTY IN THE CITY TODAY

**RETURNING FROM THREE MONTHS' TRIP HUNTING FOR BIG  
GAME IN ALASKA—YACHT CAME FROM  
BOSTON.**

A party of wealthy American sportsmen arrived in the city about 7 o'clock last night on the private yacht *Adventures* of New York, owned by one of the party, John Borden, a Chicago millionaire. With Mr. Borden are Harry Scott of San Francisco and R. Andrews of the Scientific Museum of New York City. Another member of the party, William Brown of Chicago, left the yacht at Kodiak Island a couple of weeks ago to return home.

Mr. John Borden, although an American, is a cousin of Premier Borden of Canada. The *Adventures*, with its distinguished party, has been cruising in Alaskan waters for the past three months. The party has been out on a purely pleasure trip, being in search of big game. It was the intention also to go after whales, the boat being equipped with a special whaling boat, but they arrived too late in the season to indulge in this sport. They report game rather difficult to get in the north, nevertheless they were successful in capturing six bear, three caribou and lots of smaller game. While in the north they made their headquarters at Dutch Harbor in Alaska. They also spent a good deal of time in the vicinity of Kodiak Island.

The *Adventures* left Boston on February 13th last, sailing through the Straits of Magellan in charge of Captain Charles Spark and a crew of six men. She is a two sticker, 101 feet over all and 75 feet on the water line, with a draught of 11 feet. She is of the semi-knockabout type, equipped with an 80 horsepower Frisco Standard engine and a five horsepower standard engine for electric light and electric anchor hoist. The yacht is also equipped with a one k. w. wireless set. Speaking to Captain

#### BRITAIN AND UNITED STATES AT OUTS REGARDING MEXICO

**LONDON NEWSPAPERS FEAR SERIOUS EMBROIDMENT BETWEEN THE GOVERNMENTS OF THE TWO COUNTRIES—SECRECY ON BOTH SIDES.**

(Special to The Daily News.)  
London, Oct. 23.—The newspapers here are awakening to the possibility of an embroilment between the United States and Great Britain over the Mexican situation. The *Pall Mall Gazette* says: "There is evidently a grave misunderstanding between the old country and the United States over the Mexican crisis. This should speedily be removed. There are elements of danger in the situation which may easily

arouse strong feelings on both sides of the Atlantic." Other newspapers express similar forebodings, and the mystery surrounding the possible policy of the two governments is strongly commented upon.

United States Ambassador Page yesterday had a long interview with the secretary for foreign affairs, at which it is believed that the Mexican situation was fully discussed.

Washington, Oct. 23.—The state department officials decline to discuss in any way the enquiries made yesterday by Ambassador Page in London in respect to Great Britain's attitude as to the Mexican situation. It is generally believed here that this government is awaiting the result of the presidential election in Mexico on the 26th before making any definite move in the matter.

Mexico City, Oct. 23.—Two brothers of the late President Madero were arrested at Monterey yesterday, charged with complicity in a conspiracy to turn this city over to the revolutionists on the day of election.

#### IS AGAIN RELEASED

#### SCOW NEARLY UPSET LEFT AT UNION BAY

**Shipment of Lumber for Westholme Lumber Co. Came  
Near Being Lost.**

The steamer *British Columbia* arrived in port about 7 o'clock this morning with a mixed cargo, including a shipment of coal for the G. T. P. The steamer was in charge of Mate Hewison on account of the illness of Captain Foellmer, who is confined to his home in Vancouver.

On the trip up from Vancouver the *British Columbia* had in tow a scow loaded with some 300,000 feet of lumber for the Westholme Lumber Co. The scow started leaking so badly that it had to be left at Union Bay and the lumber will have to be transferred to another scow. The mate reports that the scow listed so badly that he could see right under the bottom of it. By careful handling he succeeded in getting it safely into Union Bay.

#### G. T. P. BRIDGES SUFFER FROM HIGH WATER

**Piles Knocked Out of Position by  
High Water and Debris—No  
Train Before Saturday.**

As a result of the damage done to several of the trestle bridges along the line of the G. T. P. yesterday morning's train has been cancelled and there will be no passenger train for the interior before Saturday morning. General Superintendent Mehan reports that while no very serious damage has been done a number of the bridges over the streams flowing into the Skeena have been slightly damaged by the high water and the debris brought down. New piles must be driven in several places before these will be safe for traffic.

At noon today all damage had been repaired as far as Mile 79, where the Shames River bridge is out of commission. Beyond this bridges at Lorne Creek and Phillips Creek are slightly damaged. Night and day gangs are at work making the necessary repairs as fast as possible. It is hoped the line will be in shape to operate Saturday's train.

#### TWO HUNDRED MINERS CAUGHT BY EXPLOSION

**Some Few Mangled Bodies Recovered—Little Hope of  
Rescue Entertained**

Trinidad, Col., Oct. 23.—Two hundred miners are entombed in a mine at Dawson, New Mexico, according to reports here late last night. A great explosion occurred while the men were at work.

Dawson, N.M., Oct. 23.—One hundred feet of progress was made during the night by the rescuers working in Mine No. 2, in their fight against the debris which choked the entrance to the mine. A few mangled bodies were recovered. It is believed that blockades exist for hundreds of feet into the mine and little hope is entertained here for the rescue of the entombed men.

#### TWO MORE BOATS ENGAGED IN LOCAL FISHING INDUSTRY

**RELiance FISHING COMPANY OF VICTORIA WILL OPERATE  
TWO LARGE BOATS OUT OF HERE—ONE BOAT  
NOW IN WITH CATCH.**

George W. Stennett of Victoria manager of the Alliance Fishing Company, has been in the city for the last two weeks awaiting the arrival of a couple of the company's fishing boats, which are to be operated from Prince Rupert during the winter months. Mr. Stennett has had a very extensive experience in the fishing business. He came to British Columbia a number of years ago from Grimsby, England. Speaking of the fishing industry, he said he had seen Grimsby grow from a very small town to a city of 80,000 people, all in a few years as a result of the one industry. From what he has seen and heard

of Prince Rupert he is of the opinion that even a greater future is in store for this city. One of the company's boats, the *Alliance II*, arrived in port yesterday afternoon with 25,000 pounds of halibut, representing about two and a half days' fishing. The other boat, the *Reliance I*, that the company will operate out of here is now on the banks and is expected in at any time.

The *Reliance No. 2* is of the twin screw type. She is equipped with two 64 horsepower, four cylinder Automatic engines and a five horsepower Fairbanks as an auxiliary. She is over 100 feet long and schooner rigged.
