PRINCE RUPERT CAN NOW BOAST OF A "CIVIC LEAGUE"

PROPERTY OWNERS' ASSOCIATION LAST NIGHT DECIDED TO CHANGE ITS NAME TO THE CIVIC LEAGUE — TO BE NON-PARTIZAN

There were less than twenty-five people in attendance last night at the meeting held in the Swedish church, corner of 8th and 9th Avenues, for the purpose of receiving the report of the committee appointed at a recent meeting of the Property Owners' Association of Sections 5, 6, 7, and 8, to outline some line of action for the future.

Notwithstanding the announcements in the press over the name of the president, H. E. Gampp, that the Property Owners' Association is not organized to further the interests of any particular candidates at the coming civic election the first thing shoved under the nose of each man as he entered the door was a petition asking S. M. Newton to be a candidate for the mayoralty at the next election with a request in each case for signature. The ardent supporter of the ex-mayor was no less a personage than Jack O'Brien, who gained considerable notoriety at the last election. Needless to say his action was quite offensive to several of those in attendance.

H. E. Gampp occupied the chair and after the reading of the minutes of the last meeting called upon the chairman of the special committee, Arthur Cuthbert, to read the report.

The main points in the recommendations of the committee were that the name of the association be changed to "Civic Reform League," that a membership fee of \$2 be charged and that the object of the association be to discuss openly and publicly civic issues from a non-partizan standpoint.

A motion to adopt the report of the committee amending the name of the association to the Civic League finally carried. There was considerable difference of opinion as to the advisability of electing officers at once, but a motion to do so carried.

ried and the following were elected: President, H. E. Gampp; secretary-treasurer, A. Cuthbert; Vice President, F. Shaw. Directors—Messrs. Blythe, E. L. Fisher, Derry and Montgomery.

LOGGERS ARE UNABLE TO COLLECT DAMAGES

Decision of Judge McInnes as to Application of Workman's Compensation Law

Vancouver, Oct. 20th.—Because of the fact that a logging camp cannot be regarded as either a factory of an engineering works, the Workman's Compensation Law does not apply to men employed in one of these camps. This is the decision given by Judge McInnes in deciding the case of Sanna Hill against the Victoria Lumber Company. This means that no one who is employed in a logging camp can procure compensation. The plaintiff in the case was killed by a falling log.

FISHING COMPANY MAY LOCATE AT PORT EDWARD

AMERICAN MARCONI CO WILL REDUCE RATES

Establishing a Station at San Francisco to Connect With Honolulu and Philippines

R. V. Harris, formerly located at the Digby wireless station, who was here yesterday as wireless operator on the Adventure on its way south from a three months' cruise in Alaskan waters, in conversation with a News representative stated that the American Marconi Co. has just about completed a 300 k.w. station at San Francisco. This will connect with similar stations at Honolulu and the Philippines and will practically do away with cable communication across the Pacific. Mr. Harris states that it is the intention of the company to establish a rate of 40 cents per word to Honolulu as against the present cable rate of 35 cents. The rate to Japan will be 15 cents as compared with 50 or 60 cents for cable.

Mr. Harris entertains hopes of securing the position of assistant superintendent of the San Francisco station.
