For it now appears that, according to Canadian regulations, the use of food fish except dogfish, for fertilizer is prohibited, and this was to be one of the chief sources of the company's revenue. The estimate of profit from salmon canning was based on the best quality of salmon being caught, whereas only an inferior grade is found in the waters over which it has fishing icenses. In fact, in every item of the estimate of profit the promoters have shown themselves optimistic beyond words.

Of the £125,000 subscribed by the public £25,000 went to the promoters and the balance of £100,000 has been expended on purchase of steam trawlers, etc., and on the working of the fisheries since the company was started.
