## RUMOR THAT BORDEN MAY LIKELY RESIGN

Such a Probability Was Talked  
About on the Street of Prince  
Rupert Yesterday.

Ottawa, Nov. 1.—Premier Borden is suffering from a nervous collapse, due to the strain and worry of his position.

He has left the capital on a six weeks' holiday on his physicians' advice. His destination is kept secret with a view to enabling him to have a complete rest, but it is understood he has gone to Hot Springs, Virginia, where the golfing is good.

It is freely admitted here that Mr. Borden will not be able to stand the strain of office till the conclusion of the present parliament, and there is already speculation as to who will succeed him. The names of Rogers, McBride and White are mentioned, but none are regarded here as satisfactory.

## SECOND DEBATE BY COUNCIL OF SEWER TAX QUESTION

object to the remark of Alder-  
man Kerr that the city solicitor  
had given two different opinions,  
and to the imputing of personal  
motives to anyone.

Alderman Kerr said he was not  
playing to the galleries for he  
had last year moved that the pe-  
tition for the repair of the Second  
avenue sewer be granted. He did  
object to the change of form in  
the opinion of the city solicitor.

Alderman Dybhan could not  
see where Alderman Kerr found  
any ground for saying that the  
city solicitor had advised last  
year that the sewer taxes were  
collectable. What he remem-  
bered of what the city solicitor  
had said was that if the city de-  
cided to collect the rentals there  
would be a greater responsibility  
on the city to keep the sewers in  
repair, and left it to the council  
to decide which course should be  
taken.

Alderman Maitland said that  
since the city had made the re-  
pairs on Second avenue and there  
had been money spent on the  
sewers he thought those in Sec-  
tion One who were benefited  
should pay for such repairs.

Alderman McCaffery pointed  
out that this was just what was  
proposed. It was proposed to  
have the taxes collected from  
July 1st so that the cost would  
be paid by those benefited.

Upon this explanation Alder-  
man Maitland withdrew as sec-  
ond of the amendment and the  
motion to strike off the back  
taxes and start collection of the  
sewer tax from July 1st was  
carried.

Alderman Kerr asked a ques-  
tion if a petition was being cir-  
culated for the submission of a by-  
law to enlarge the present elec-  
tric light plant.

The mayor replied that there  
was such a petition.

Alderman Kerr: Then I regis-  
ter my vote against it. I am op-  
posed to spending any more  
money on that plant.
