TO PROVIDE POLICE WITH WINTER COATS

Report of Chief Vickers for the Month of October Shows a Very Quiet Month

Comfortable overcoats to protect the city police from storm, wind and rain during the cold winter weather are to be provided. Chief Vickers put in a request for these at the meeting of the Police Commissioners yesterday afternoon and as the finances were in such shape as to permit of the expenditure, the request was granted. The chief was instructed to ask for tenders and place an order for the coats.

The report of Chief Vickers for the month of October showed fines amounting to \$158. There were only 24 cases entered during the month with twenty-one convictions. Two cases of the twenty-four are still pending, the theft and the burglary case.

Commissioner Maitland asked for a report on Comox Avenue conditions. Chief Vickers reported that where there were 57 residents of the restricted district a month ago, today there are only thirty. He also reported that the residents there now all claim that they have bought the houses which they occupy. There were only a couple of exceptions and these people had been notified to vacate.
