The Indian is rapidly becoming better educated. At present there are 249 day, 59 boarding and 19 industrial schools in operation during the year, a total of 426 of all classes. The Indian, according to the report, is losing the love for "fire water." The government, however, and its agents have been very active in their desires to suppress the illegal traffic in intoxicants and during the past year the fines collected aggregated approximately over \$2,000 more than

those collected the previous year. Crime and immorality during the year was very light and there was not a single vicious criminal case reported to the department. The birth rate during the year averaged about 35 per thousand, while the mortality rate was about 28 per thousand.


